### Kay's Kitchen

At long last the outdoor barbecue season is here. The following simple recipes are perfect for a barbecue of any kind and will round out the menu when served with hot French bread. So get in the mood, and try these salads with your favorite barbecue.

- ITALIAN SALAD: 4 cups lettuce, head of fresh garden lettuce, in pieces 1/2 cup cress, 2 medium tomatoes cut in wedges, don't forget to peel! 1 small cucumber, thinly sliced 1 ounce thin sliced pepperoni cut into squares 1 cup cubed Mozarella cheese 1/2 10 ounce package cooked lima beans, drained Italian dressing. In salad bowl combine lettuce, cucumber, tomatoes, cucumber, pepperoni, and cheese. Sprinkle with salt and seasoned pepper. Toss with dressing.
COUNTRY POTATO SALAD: 8 to 10 small new potatoes, cooked and peeled. In 1 quart bowl: 1 head of lettuce, turn in bite size pieces 2 hard cooked eggs, diced 2 1/4 thinly sliced green onions 6 slices bacon, cooked 1/2 cup vinegar 1 teaspoon seasoned salt 1/2 teaspoon celery seed 1/2 teaspoon seasoned pepper. Leave very small potatoes whole, halve or quarter others. In salad bowl combine lettuce, potatoes, eggs, and onion. Cook bacon till crisp; drain, reserving 1/2 cup of the drippings. Crumble bacon and add to salad. To reserved drippings, add remaining ingredients. Bring to boiling. Pour over salad. Toss quickly. Serve at once. If desired, bring to a boil to increase the ingredients to make more salad. Be sure to taste for more seasoning.VEGETABLE SALAD: 1/2 cup green vegetable: Beans, broccoli, asparagus, okra, brussels sprouts or cauliflower cooked and cooled, then tossed with Italian or oil and vinegar dressing, and sprinkled with Parmesan cheese, makes a delicious salad. Try a combination of leftover vegetables and see how you like them. Remember do not over-cook the vegetables. Bring to a boil, then try different dressings and decide which you like best. The addition of sliced water chestnuts and mushrooms broiled in butter will add to the flavor and taste for more seasoning.GRAND BEEF SALAD: 1 pound ground beef 1 envelope of dry onion soup mix 1/2 cup water 1 medium head of lettuce, in pieces 1 large tomato, peeled and cut into pieces 1/2 cup cooked green pepper 1/2 cup sliced ripe olives 1 cup aged sharp cheddar cheese 1/4 cup onion finely minced. In skillet brown ground beef. Drain off fat. Add onion, green pepper, olives and cheese. Toss well. Place lettuce mixture on individual salad plates. Spoon on meat; top with corn chips. Makes six servings.ONION-BUTTER HARD ROLLS: Blend 1 cup margarine, 1 tablespoon finely chopped green onion, 1 tablespoon finely minced parsley, and 1/2 teaspoon rosemary. Mix well. Have hard rolls and spread with mixture. Wrap in foil and bake 15 minutes.ONION-CHEESE LOAF: Cut loaf of French bread at an angle and cut 1 inch thick slices, cutting almost, but not through bottom crust. Blend 6 tablespoons margarine with 3 tablespoons prepared mustard; spread over top surface. Insert a slice of sharp cheddar cheese and a thin slice of onion or seasoned salt in each loaf. Wrap loaf in foil; heat over medium coals 15 minutes or until heated through and cheese melted.

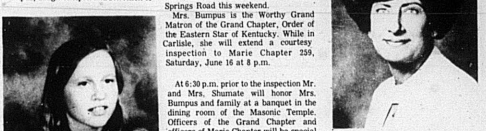
