G.I. education benefits expire '74

Although G. I. Bill education benefits for thousands of Veterans are expiring May 31, 1974, the Veterans Administration emphasized today that the May 31 expiration date does not affect G. I. Bill job or farm cooperative training, apprenticeship or flight training benefits for veterans.

This clarification was made by Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson. He pointed out that education benefits for those discharged prior to June 1, 1966, would expire on May 31, 1974, the eighth anniversary of the current G. I. Bill.

The 1966 law allows each veteran eight years to complete his training. The time is computed from the individual's date of discharge or from the date of the law, whichever is later.

Johnson explained that the original bill did not include flight, apprenticeship, on-the-job and farm cooperative training, so eligibility for those benefits will not expire for Post Korean veterans until Aug. 30, 1974, which is eight years after the date they were authorized by law.

Veterans who have benefits may soon expire, or any eligible veteran interested in G. I. Bill benefits, are urged to contact any VA office or representative of local veterans service organizations.

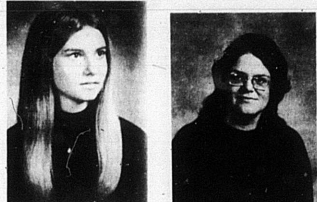

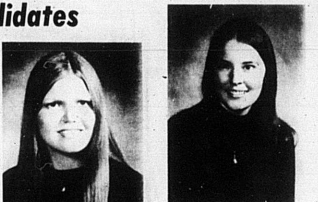
Engine association to hold show at Paris stockyards July 6, 7, 8

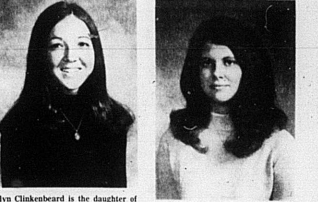

Historical committee holds first meeting
The Nicholas County Sequential-Biennial Committee held its first meeting on June 19 at the First National Bank.

Plant tobacco with no-illage? Agronomy researchers at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture are studying the possibility of developing tobacco plants that are free of no-illage.

Two of the field trials will deal with foreign. A mechanical pasture renovation developed by the University of Kentucky will be demonstrated, and plots grown by this new machine will be shown. Visitors will also have a chance to turn the latest information on alfalfa weevil control.

A three-year-old stand of Kenner Red clover will be shown on one of the forage trays. This is a new variety which will be used to illustrate the effects of setting and a residual herbicide is used to control weeds after setting. A modified tobacco sizer is used for planting and cuts up the soil.

Low tobacco varieties, including plots of Maryland tobacco, will also be shown and the most profitable time to plant tobacco plants grown from pollen grains, various fertilizer rates, and safe use of systemic insecticides.

Farm program certifications deadline

There are only two weeks left for Nicholas county farmers to certify their crop and farm program after the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Office. Final date for certifying is July 15.

Following certification, certain farms are picked at random for a spot check. These farms are visited, and program acreages checked. Accuracy of the certification is determined by comparing actual acreages with those certified by the producer.

Sen. Hudleston named to subcommittee
