Senator Huddleston comments on freeze

The administration has finally acted in an attempt to put a halt to the spiraling inflation of recent months. However, I view the President's 6-day freeze on prices as a minimum first step that by itself cannot accomplish the goal of bringing inflation under control.

The success or failure of the administration's program will depend entirely on what the President proposes under Phase IV. If the standards, guidelines, and regulations are weak, as was the case in Phase III, the program will surely fail. I hope the President will be willing to take a tough approach to insure against higher prices, higher interest rates, and higher rents.

Inflation has literally been out of control under Phase III, evidenced by the fact that during the first four months of 1972 wholesale prices increased at an annual rate of 21.2 percent—compared with an annual rate of 7 percent during Phase II when tougher, mandatory controls were in effect.

Coupled with these rising prices has been a continuation of high unemployment. In April, 8 percent of the U.S. labor force—some 4.5 million Americans—were without a job. These are Americans who are unable to participate in the U.S. economy—to contribute to it and earn the necessary income to purchase the commodities needed for themselves and their families.

Those of us in Kentucky can be happy that President Nixon has signed the Economic Development Act which will extend several worthwhile programs of the Economic Development Administration. Earlier, the administration had proposed that E.D.A. be phased out in fiscal 1973. However, the Senate and the House passed bills extending these programs and the President wisely decided not to veto the legislation.

Since the E.D.A. programs were begun in 1965, Kentucky has received some \$90 million for water and sewer projects, industrial site development, vocational and technical assistance, and other job-related programs. California is the only state to receive more E.D.A. money than Kentucky. These programs have demonstrated their effectiveness in providing community services and stimulating economic growth, and it would have been tragic had the E.D.A. been eliminated.

Commission approves financing plan
