Because of his position as ranking minority member of the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration, Senator Marlow Cook was named on June 19 to be assistant floor manager for a bill to reduce the time for federal elections.
Although Senator Cook has expressed his support for the measure, S. 343, he announced that he would introduce an amendment to extend the election time further, rather than that bill presently provides.
S. 343, which was introduced by Sen. Robert C. Byrd (D-W. Va.), is designed to shorten the overall period of election campaigning, thus reducing somewhat the costs of those campaigns, providing a longer period after election for settling any contests, and allowing residents in

Warrants charge 3 in beating

Three persons have been charged in warrants with assault and battery in connection with a beating suffered by Daley Earlywine, 38, of the Carpenter Road, Nicholas County, when he was acting as security officer at the Bourbon Drive-In Theatre.
The theatre is owned and operated by his father, Everett Earlywine.
The incident occurred shortly after midnight Friday, with Earlywine being treated at the Bourbon County Hospital for severe lacerations about the head, which required 59 stitches.
Two juvenile boys, aged 16 and 17, were arrested on the warrants in Lexington at about 2 a.m. Sunday morning according to Bourbon County Deputy Sheriff Ronnie Arroy. The third person for which a

warrant was obtained was James Fryman, 24, who gave himself up Monday morning at the sheriff's office, the deputy said.
The case is to be heard Friday in Bourbon County Court before Judge J.M. Leer.
