Center offers alcoholism help

The Nicholas County Comprehensive Care Center offers treatment for people with problems associated with alcoholism. A recent study indicates that 68 percent of adults in the United States drink alcohol occasionally. Of these, about five percent are correctly classified as alcoholics.

Alcoholism is not reserved for any particular class of people as all types may fall victim of the disease.

The popular image of the alcoholic as a skid-row drunk stumbling through the streets from one bar to the next every night of the week. Actually, the skid-row drunk makes up only about five percent of the alcoholics in the United States.

Statistics indicate that well over half those who suffer from alcoholism are employed.

Alcoholism is a disease which manifests itself by the uncontrolled drinking of the victim and if left untreated, the alcoholism will grow worse year by year. Eventually, alcohol will drive its victim further from reality to either insanity or death.

In many cases, people who are close to the alcoholic are unaware of the disease in their family. If the family is blind to the problems, skilled counseling may be the answer.

It has been estimated that there are approximately 1,500,000 alcoholics in the United States. This includes the rich and poor, and the young and the old.

Edwards kicks-off Easter Seal Campaign

Edwards, National Chairman for the 1973 Easter Seal Campaign, was the kick-off speaker for the Kentucky campaign at a luncheon in Louisville, Monday, Mar. 5.

Edwards, the creator of "Election's - This Is Your Life" and "Truth or Consequences", is on a nationwide tour for the 1973 campaign. He made appearances at Louisville for the statewide kick-off luncheon and on Monday evening at the society's Cardinal Hill House.

Thomas P. Bell, Lexington attorney and Kentucky Campaign Chairman, introduced Edwards at both meetings. The 1973 campaign began Mar. 1 and continued through April 22, Easter Sunday.

Contributions to the campaign help provide services for physically handicapped Kentuckians. The society operates day care facilities at Paducah, Lexington, Covington, Ashland, Louisville, Carrollton, and Morehead. Last year more than 2500 people received services.

Average tax deduction, \$1,800 locally

Bread cast upon the waters during the past year by Nicholas county residents in the form of charitable donations are now returning as blessings.

So are various other expenditures such as for local and state taxes, for doctors' bills and the like.

To people who are going over their financial figures, preliminary to working up their income tax returns, the outlays of yesterday are the tax deductions of today.

How much do these deductions amount to? What have other people who itemize their deductions and are in similar income brackets been listing for charities, medical expenses and such?

In general, it is found, it ranges from 16 to 25 percent of adjusted gross income. The percentage is higher among those in the lower brackets and lower for those with large incomes.

Local families with an income of \$7,000 to \$8,000, for example, would have a deduction of 21 percent if they conformed to the average, whereas those at the \$15,000 to \$20,000 level would be taking 17 percent.

Nationally, for those with earnings equal to the average prevailing in Nicholas county, the amount normally listed for charitable deductions is \$200, for interest paid on loans and installment debt, \$500, for local and state taxes, \$500, and, for medical and dental costs, \$340.

If a family's deductions run higher than those taken by most others, it does not mean that they will be disallowed. Nor does conforming mean that they will be automatically approved. It is pointed out as deductions are properly documented and that records be available to back up the claims.

Lexington Road site out BGI president Shumate says

Wayne Shumate, president of Blue Grass Industries, announced Friday that the company's proposed new distribution and display plant will not be built on the Lexington Road site selected in Bourbon County.

The announcement was made after a suit was filed to block the Bourbon County Fiscal Court's decision to override the Bourbon County Joint Planning Commission's refusal to rezone the site from agricultural to light industry.

Shumate's statement said that his company needs to start building as soon as possible and not be delayed by what could be years in the courts as a result of litigation.

A feasibility study will be begun soon to determine alternate locations for the proposed multi-million dollar, colonial style plant.
