

## Kidney Foundation designates March 'Gift of Life Month'

March has been designated "Gift of Life Month" in the State of Kentucky. All citizens are urged to assist the Kidney Foundation of Central Kentucky in its efforts to save the lives of the victims of kidney disease.

The University of Kentucky Medical Center facilities for kidney transplant are being expanded. Medical science has developed kidney transplant techniques

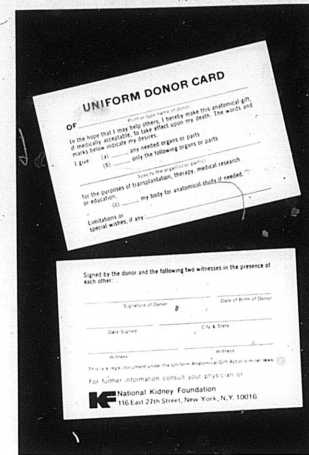
to the point that more than 60% of the transplants are successful. When the transplant fails the patient resumes use of the artificial kidney machine. The rate at which the community makes kidneys

available is now a major factor in determining how many lives can be relieved by kidney transplants. Needless death and confinement to kidney machines is a problem in our state. A

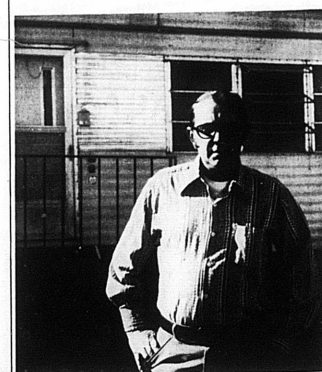
person who has kidney disease and is dependent upon an artificial kidney machine for existence has one chance—somebody lead a normal life again—a cadaver kidney transplant.

The central theme of this month's program is to promote understanding of the need for granting permission to remove specified organs at the time of a person's death for transplantation to a critically ill person—the "Gift of Life."

The Uniform Donor Card pictured is a legal document which authorizes a physician to remove specified organs after the death of the donor for transplant purposes. These cards are available from members of the Carlisle Junior Woman's Club and Mrs. Ralph Taylor, county chairman.



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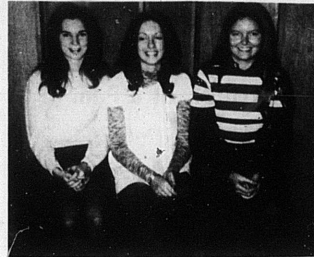

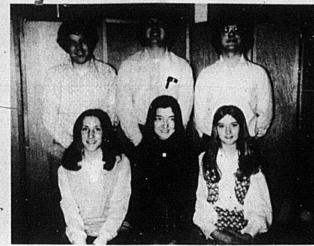

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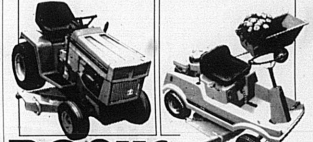


### Sewing Contests and Third-place winner

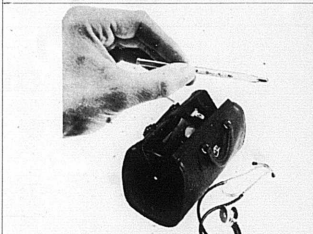
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
