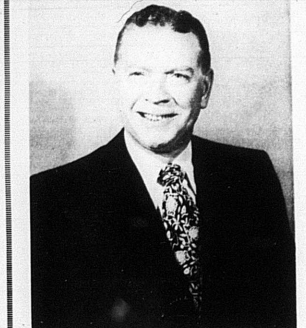

STORING FROZEN FOODS. A good way to cut food costs is to buy frozen food at its lowest price. Several readers have written asking how to store frozen foods. The answer is simple: store them in the proper storage bins.
Remember that the packages must be properly sealed and kept at a constant temperature.
represent the maximum storage limits for containers.
1 month - Ice cream, milk sherbet; unbacked bread; whipped cream.
2 months - Cheddar, edam and Swiss cheese; angel and chignon cakes; fresh sausage; cured pork.
3 months - White bread, plain rolls; doughnuts; ground beef, lamb and veal; lamb patties; liver, Swiss steak, meat pies; clam, scallops; 'fatty' fish (bluefish, perch, mackerel); TV dinners (shrimp, lamb, pork).
4 months - Baked pies, chocolate layer cake; fried chicken; veal chops; chicken; variety meats; lamb, duck, goose (whole).
5 months - Cooked chicken, turkey, ham, pork, duck, pork (whole).
6 months - Unbacked fruit pies; vegetables, lamb, veal and pork (roast).
7 months - Fresh fruit and fruit juice concentrates; beef ribs; whole chicken; whole chicken and turkey; smoked shrimp; baked oysters; eggs in shell; when frozen, so plan to use as soon as possible.
8 months - Sliced bread and instant cereals rapidly become water-cream (except whipped cream); cream cheese alone (okay if it's mixed with other foods); custard; plain cream; pudding; angel food cake; vegetable cuts that are eaten raw.
9 months - Your own food, such as fruits and vegetables, the Department of Agriculture suggests you freeze no more than two pounds of food per cubic foot of freezer at one time.
