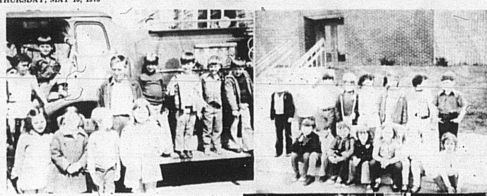

Senators and Giants win Babe Ruth season opens Friday

 The Nicholas County Babe Ruth League opened its 1973 season Friday, as a few hundred chilly fans watched. The first game saw the Senators defeat the Vets 4 to 3. Grimes started for the winners with Thompson taking over in the 6th to get the save. They gave up a combined total of 3 runs, 6 hits, 6 walks and 7 strikeouts. The losing pitcher was Gray who went the distance for the Vets. He gave up 7 hits, walked 3 and struck out 7.

The Senators, managed by J.R. Kimesey, scored 3 in the second and 2 in the third. The Vets picked up 2 runs in the last inning. Ronny Smith's Vets, had the honor of being the first team to score during the 1973 season, as they plated a run in the top of the second. Scoring the season's first run was R. Malton who opened the inning with a double. The first HR of '73 went to J. Rose who followed with a single. Other extra base hits went to G. Thompson and Grimes, both Senators. The nightcap was highlighted with a one-hitter by the Giants' Rocky Hicks, as they stomped the Dodgers 4-0. Hicks struck out 10 and walked 5. The losing pitcher was McGarity, who allowed 6 hits while walking 6 and striking out 7. Rodney Hatton's Giants scored 3 in the

bottom of the third by using about every method possible. The inning started off with a walk. Before it was over there was a hit batsman, stolen bases, errors and a timely hit by Fryman. The result was 3 runs. They picked up 3 more in the bottom of the fifth for their 8 run total. Larry McKee couldn't get his Dodgers rolling. The only threat they had was in the final inning when a runner reached third. But he was thrown out trying to score on a wild pitch for the game's final out. J. Plank got the Dodgers only hit—a line drive to center. There were no extra base hits in the game. The umpires were Cliff Vice, Homer Letcher and Roy Fryman. Tuesday night at 6:00 p.m. the Senators meet the Dodgers while the Vets play the Giants at 8:00.

Although using only four freshmen the young Nicholas County team scored 54 points with 19 boys earning points for the team and second place in the meet. The Cave Run Conference includes freshmen in their

junior high competition. The meet was highlighted by Steve Fryman's low hurdle victory and William Bean's 7 1/2 points.

The Nicholas County High School girls track team was led by Rachel Booth's firsts in the shot and discus for 10 points as they won second place honors in the Cave Run Conference Meet. Chestina Young followed with 8 1/2 points. Others scoring for Nicholas County were Mona Garrett, Carla Pryor, Kathy Austin, Connie Gates, Mona McLean, Sheila McLean, Vanessa Williams, and Debbie Hatcher. The girls scored a total of 53 points and brought home the runner-up trophy as well as 34 individual medals.

Jackets lose to Bourbon

Nicholas County Blue Jackets baseball team lost to Bourbon County 19-2 on Monday, May 7, blocking the Jackets after earlier in the season beating the Colonels 19-3.

The Colonels exploded for seven runs in the first inning, adding two more runs in the top of the second and one in the top of the third to have a 10-0 lead going before Nicholas County awoke.

The Jackets managed to bring across their two runs in the bottom of the third inning. Neither team scored in the fourth

inning. In the fifth Bourbon tallied four runs, added one in the sixth and three in the seventh and final frame. Bourbon County collected a total of 13 hits off the Nicholas County pitchers—R. Fryman starting on the mound, but being relieved by Darber in the first, followed by Hicks in the third. Darber came back to the mound in the fifth and was again relieved by Hicks in the sixth.
