### WOMAN'S WORKWORLD

A fair for raising plus a shortage of money can total opportunity as a consignment shop owner. That's right, a shortage of money — not much capital is needed for this venture. You can even operate part time, such as 2 1/2 p.m. through Sat. If your overhead is low enough, consignment shop selling is a type of selling applicable to many kinds of merchandise.

In a consignment shop, the person who brings an article to sell the consignor is given only a receipt for the article. When the article has been sold, the consignor is paid the selling price less the commission (ten to per cent) the shop operator gets for her services. Business deals on running such a shop are found in the U.S. Small Business Administration's "Starting and Managing a Swap Shop or Consignment Sale Shop." This 78-page booklet is available for \$5 cents from the Dept. of Commerce, Washington, D.C. 20402.

Acquiring merchandise is a matter of advertising in suburban and weekly newspapers, and sending announcements to interested groups. However, you must be able to refuse merchandise you can't sell, or you'll incur losses by white elephants.

Operate easy, offer no delivery or credit services. Consignors bring merchandise and customers pay cash in advance. You should have insurance against fire, burglary and certain other causes of loss. However, you need not accept responsibility for shoplifting or breakage.

A crafts boutique is an ideal application of this type of selling; local artisans are charged to find outlets for their creations. Clothing stores are another natural, but used garments must be in good repair and attractive. Antiques, collectibles, and nostalgia items can run a wide range: furniture, glassware, comic books, and hardware (knives, and bare fixtures) to list a few "artistic" discounts. Consignment shops are relatively easy to start and offer an immediate second income.

### MEDICINE CHEST

Why are some people allergic to medicines while others are not? Mrs. J.

One explanation offered is "The white blood cells are not working right." So says Dr. John Stanulis, a researcher at the Georgetown University School of Medicine. He found that the white blood cells of allergic people are not able to take up pollen as efficiently as those of nonallergic people. Next time you sneeze, blame it on your white blood cells.

For what do I take Quin-Tan and Davron with A.S.A. Are they dangerous to take? I have asthma pneumonia... V.K.

The Dren-Tate controls and hopefully prevents your asthma attacks. The Davron with A.S.A. relieves mild to moderate pain. No medication is absolutely safe. I periodically check your nebulizer by aiming it at a dark background so that you can see the mist. Soon you will know what the quantity of mist should look like. (2) Wash your nebulizer after each usage with clear water, to avoid clogging.

Do antacids contain potent drugs? — D.L.

The chemicals in antacids are not potent in themselves. But they are potentially dangerous. For example, some antacids contain high amounts of sodium. If you are restricted to a low salt diet, this could be dangerous.
