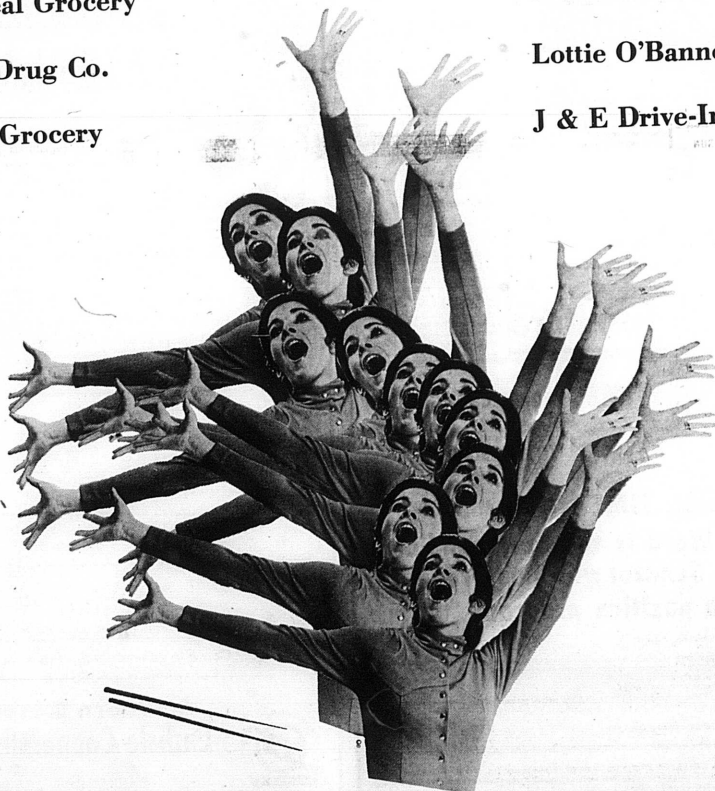

COMMISSIONER **BUTLER** LOOKS AT Agriculture

This year's observance of Soil Stewardship Week has been set for May 27 through June 3. Soil Stewardship Week has been observed for many years and generally receives considerable support throughout the State. A number of churches holds special services as a part of this observance and sometimes a State-wide service is held at a designated church. Regardless of whether or not a special service is held in recognition of Soil Stewardship Week, I think most people

recognize its purpose as being significant. The soil is basic to man's existence and needless to say, the wise use of our soil resources is paramount to an abundant life as far as food and fiber are concerned. Soil Stewardship Week is not necessarily a rural or agricultural observance because all people have a direct interest in the soil. At the same time, however, I feel that farmers, by the nature of their work, are more closely allied with the soil and nature than people in other vocations. Too, it is a credit to agriculture that farmers have been pioneers in the conservation of our soil and other natural resources. Perhaps a major part of this conservation effort has been lost through a "feeling" for the soil and nature in general. I feel that the passing of each year adds to the significance of soil stewardship week because of the increased demands being made upon our land. We have more people who must have a place to live, to
