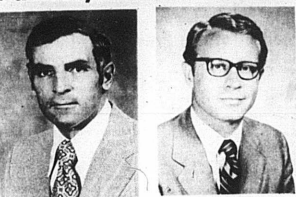


Outstanding clubwoman

RECC seeks 'Miss Fleming' contestants

All girls between the ages of 16 and 21 who are unmarried and the members of a family living on a Farming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation service area are invited to be contestants in the annual 'Miss Fleming-Mason RECC of 1973' contest. The contest will be held in conjunction with the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the cooperative to be held July 17.

The Miss Fleming-Mason RECC winner will receive a sparkling crown, the coveted title winner's sash, a white lantern sash suit, \$200 cash and an all expense trip to Louisville for the state contest. Her parents will also be given an all expense trip to the state contest.

An alternate will also be chosen at the annual meeting in Feringburg, who will replace the winner should she be unable to participate in the State Contest.

In Louisville, the representative of Fleming-Mason RECC and winners from other cooperatives, will receive special training by professional beauty consultants, makeup and hair styling experts and will engage in special social gatherings.

The winner of the 'Miss Kentucky RECC Beauty Pageant', the oldest continuously conducted beauty contest in the state, will receive many valuable prizes including a \$500 scholarship, an expense-paid trip to the National Finals and an expense-paid trip to Washington, D.C. in June, 1974. There will also be prizes for the first and second runner-up and a Miss Cordiality award.

The winner of the National Pageant will receive a \$2,000 scholarship and will represent the National Rural Electric Cooperative in all functions.

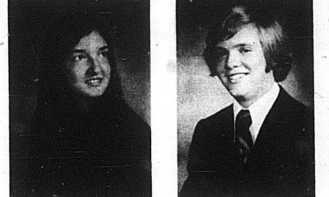
\$3,072 allocated here for youth employment

Governor Wendell H. Ford announced today that \$3,072,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor has been made available to provide jobs for the disadvantaged youth in 87 counties in Kentucky this summer. Of this amount \$1272 is allocated to Nicholas County.

The agreement, signed by state Economic Security Commissioner GALE Haecker and Cattle Lou Miller, commissioner of state personnel, provides for summer jobs for approximately 2,500 disadvantaged youth in certain eligible public agencies throughout the state.

Youth will be employed only by public agencies for an eight-week period beginning June 18 and ending Aug. 11. Jobs will be funded by the federal government. *Please turn to page 10
