Perkins calls for funding of Neighborhood Youth Corps

Rep. Carl Perkins has kicked off an all-out effort to fund the Neighborhood Youth Corps, saying that "youngsters who want to work, and need a summer job so they can go back to school in September, ought to be helped."

The Seventh District Congressman said that if the Administration has its way, "a lot of youngsters in Kentucky—and all over the rest of the country—are going to be walking the streets with nothing to do, and we can't let that happen."

Perkins cited reports from Kentucky counties showing that in some cases approximately 25 percent of the youngsters who would have returned to school to finish their education next September will not be able to, unless the Neighborhood Youth Corps funds are forthcoming.

"The scariest thing about this—besides what it is doing to young people—is the way the Administration is going about it," Perkins said.

"They're talking about \$711,000 coming from the Labor Department this summer, but they aren't saying that \$711,000 is just a drop in the bucket compared to what we need in Kentucky."

"We got \$6,238,000 in Neighborhood Youth Corps money last year, and that's more than 15,000 young people to work. The \$711,000 would put 2,300 youngsters to work, and that's a far cry from over 15,000," Perkins said.

"And the Administration is talking about taking \$500 million out of another program called the Emergency Employment Act for young people, but that's just playing tricks with government funds," Perkins said.

"We passed the Emergency Employment Act to get older people and Vietnam veterans into temporary employment which would lead to a regular full-time job," he said.

"Now the Administration comes along and wants to take this money away from fathers and mothers and older brothers who fought in Vietnam—and give it to the school children," he said.

"What that would do to the families should not be happening in America," Perkins said.

Emergency Employment Act of 1971 and will be apportioned as equally as possible city and county governments and local city or county school systems.

Commissioner Huecker said the department's 25 local offices will provide job information, screening, referral, orientation and counseling to all interested applicants.

Jobs are expected to fall into four general occupational categories: clerical, maintenance, service and semi-skilled labor.

Commissioner Huecker said once applicants have begun working, an employment service counselor from the local employment office will provide follow-up counseling and supportive services as needed.

Employed youth will be paid bi-weekly at the rate of \$1.60 an hour for a total of 20 hours per week or 40 weeks in each pay period.
