Sara S. Elmer, County Extension Agent for 441, was one of more than 80 persons who participated in the 7th Annual Conference of the National Association of Extension 4-H Agents, held Oct. 28-Nov. 1 at Roanoke, Va. She and her husband were among the 43 delegates attending from Kentucky.

The conference theme was "Turn In-Turn On" and was designed for Extension youth personnel involved in 4-H work. Keynote speaker, Dr. H. Kirby Krams, Assistant Chief of the Delinquency Prevention Bureau for Delaware, and feature speaker, Rev. Charles H. Gibbons, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Bristol, Tenn., set the tone for the professional youth workers by speaking on "Fine Tuning for Action".

Conference highlights included the presentation of the "4-H Report to the Nation Team" and awarding of Distinguished Service and 25-year service awards to 60 agents. 441 agents from Kentucky receive Distinguished Service Awards were: Harold Rice, Greenup county and John Rickett, Laurel county. A series of nine seminars rounded out the week with topics varying from improving communications and understanding money to innovative teaching through camping and 4-H work in urban and rural areas.

Hart asks bill passage

At a recent meeting of the legislator's interim committee on Counties, Rep. Charles Hart, D-Dwightville, called for passage of a bill which would reduce the fees collected by county officials.

The proposed bill would combine all fees collected by county officials into a county treasury, from which the officials' salaries would be paid. "This system would make our county officials more accountable to the public," said Rep. Hart.

The committee also approved a bill for prefiling, which would allow local school boards to levy their own taxes. "In the past," said Rep. Hart, "county fiscal courts had to approve the school board's levy, with the court taking the responsibility for the tax."

"If passed by the 1974 General Assembly, the bill will allow the school boards, who levy the tax, to take the responsibility for it," he added. Rep. Hart also is a member of the interim committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources. "We are looking into environmental aspects of solid waste disposal," Rep. Hart said. "Non-recyclable containers, such as plastic and throw away bottles are polluting our roads, lakes, and streams," he said. The committee is considering proposed legislation that would require all beer and soft drink containers to carry refund values.
