## Dr. Coleman club speaker

The Carlisle Junior Women's Club (G.W.C.) met at the library on Monday night, Nov. 12.  
The International Affairs Department introduced Dr. Kenneth M. Coleman, former of Public Health, University of Kentucky, who gave an interesting talk on Latin American Government and Politics, with particular emphasis on Mexico and its attitude toward the U.S. The major problem in our relationship with Mexico and the other Latin American countries is that we know so little about them," stated Dr. Coleman. "Mexico is so close yet so far away."  
Dr. Coleman also stated that he felt relations with Mexico would improve if we recognized four important points, namely:

Mexicans have made contributions to world culture in plastic arts, the film industry, painting, theatre, folk dance and literature, to name only a few. Mexico has a history of multi-racial society. Mexicans have done a good job of living together, perhaps better than the U.S. Mexicans perceive what is happening in the U.S. Mexicans have shown a way out of developmental problems.

Dr. Coleman noted that he respected Mexicans for what they have accomplished. The Mexicans value family life. They would allow us leaving our homes and present jobs for better jobs. They institutions (nursing homes and the like) are to be barbaric. It worries Mexicans that we are so self assured, that we consider ourselves so far in advance of them. Mexico has had great progress and economic development. Mexico is a free country. It receives virtually no foreign aid from us.

Dr. Coleman stated that the fact that Mexican newspapers carry the fact that Mexican newspapers carry the fact almost every day of war account of Watergate, which had little impact on the Mexicans. Also Dr. Coleman stated that the average Mexican does not read any major newspaper.
