Growing corn on steep land causes erosion

In 1974 it is expected that more farmers of Nicholas county will turn to grain as their extra income due to the favorable price of corn and other grain crops. Growing corn on too steep land is a great source of erosion. To be exact, to grow any row crops on land that is too steep is a source of erosion and pollution. When we think in terms of it taking 70 years to produce one inch of top soil, it is very important to keep that top soil in place. Of course it is also important to have row crops on the deeper soils of the farm and soils that are the most workable.

The Soil Conservation Service will assist any land user or owner in finding his best land for row crops. If you are not already a District Cooperator through your local Conservation District, you can become one by signing up as a District Cooperator. Of course, all this is a free

service. The Soil Conservation Service can have their soil scientist to come to your farm and map your farm. This will give each soil by name and class. From this map you will know the slope of the land, depth, texture, amount of erosion, drainage and other things. This is the true scientific approach to your farming.

Many farmers are already cooperators but if you don't have a soils map of your farm or have the map you had, come to the Soil Conservation Service office in the basement of the Post Office Building at Carlisle and we will help you get another map.

In about five months we will be planting corn but if you will come in now or call 285-5241, we will help you get ready for corn planting in 1974. You may need some diversion channels, terraces, graded waterways, tile drainage, contour guide lines or some other
