## U. S. Judge to study transcript of teacher trial, then give verdict

U.S. District Judge H. David Herrmann ruled Thursday in Lexington told four former Nicholas county teachers that it will be more than a week before he can decide if they will get their jobs back.

The plaintiffs are Tom Metcalfe, David J. Piersal, Mrs. Angela A. Nalanco and Mrs. Kathy Hanson. The four testified Wednesday that they were fired by Nicholas County Superintendent of Schools, D.P. Parsley, and the Nicholas County School Board because of their activities in an affiliate of the Kentucky Teachers' Association.

The teachers said they were notified by the school board of their dismissals after the 1972-73 school year. They said the board gave no reason for not reemploying the teachers.

All were unemerged teachers at Nicholas County Elementary last year. Mrs. Hanson, with financial support from the NEA, won a \$20,000 judgment in Nicholas Circuit Court last February against the school board.

In that case, Mrs. Hanson fought her demotion during the last school year from sixth grade teacher to an instructor in the Head Start program. The court awarded her salary losses caused by the demotion and instructed the school board to reinstate her.

In testimony Thursday two Head Start

administrators said Mrs. Hanson's supervisor was forced to recommend the instructor's dismissal by D.P. Parsley, Nicholas County School Superintendent.

Mrs. Ruth Swartz, parent coordinator for the Head Start program, said in April she advised the supervisor, Mrs. Eleanor Talbert, to "let Mr. Parsley do his own

## Marshall 'write-in' Council candidate

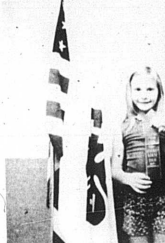
Earl Marshall announced Tuesday that he will be a "write-in" candidate for one of the six seats on the Carlisle City Council in the Nov. 6 election.

## ASC farmer-committee election

The Nicholas County ASC Community Committee elections will be held this year in December. The ballots will be mailed from the ASC Office on Nov. 22 and returned by Dec. 4.

A list of eligible voters for the elections is now being compiled at the ASC Office. Every effort has been made to include all persons believed to be eligible to vote in the ASC farmer-committee election.

Any farmer eligible to participate in an ASC program may add his name to the roll up until the election date. Farmers may check at the local ASC Office to make sure that they are listed to receive ballots in this mail election. Farmers and the general public may inspect the list from Oct. 4, until the election date.

Voter eligibility for ASC Committee elections is non-discriminatory and is applicable without regard to race, creed, color, sex or national origin.

A farmer who is eligible to participate in any ASC program is eligible to vote in

the ASC election. This includes producers of legal voting age who own, rent, or sharecrop a farm and minors who supervise and conduct farming operations on an entire farm. Spouses of eligible voters can participate in ASC elections if they are joint owners or joint tenants of the farm. A producer may only receive one ballot for one community even though he has farming interests in different communities.

There are four communities in the county. There will be one committee elected for each community. Each committee is composed of three members. The committees are established and the boundaries are designated as follows:

Community "A"—Headquarters and Myersville.

Community "B"—Bellville and Bartwell.

Community "C"—Morefield and East Union.

Community "D"—Carlisle and Park

Nicholas county farmers are encouraged to nominate candidates for the community committees from their community. Petitions, to be signed by a minimum of three qualified voters, must be filed by Oct. 29, at the County ASC Office located on Main Street in Carlisle. Eligible farmers may sign as many nominating petitions as they wish. No special petition form is required, but the petition must include a statement that the nominee is willing to serve if elected.

Nominees must have voting interests within the ASC Community, be a qualified ASC voter and not have reached their 70th birthday by the date they take office. Further details on nominations for ASC community committees may be obtained from the County ASC Office.

ASC community committees elected by mail ballots on Nov. 22 will assist the County ASC Committee with ASC programs, conduct farm community meetings, and serve as delegates to the County Convention to elect the County ASC Committee.

## Daniel receives CAP certificate

Joseph P. Jones Jr., president of the State Board of Accountancy, announced recently that certificates as Certified Public Accountant had been issued to 38 persons in Kentucky. Twenty-six of these were issued by examination and 12 by waiver of examination based upon certification issued in other states.

## Millersburg youth dies in crash

James Harry Hatten Jr., 17, of Millersburg in Millersburg was killed about 1:30 a.m. Saturday when a car in which he was a passenger slammed into a tree in Nicholas county bringing an abrupt and tragic end to a high speed chase, according to State Trooper Carl Hayes.

Trooper Hayes said Hatten was pronounced dead on arrival at the

hospital in Millersburg. The youth was believed to have been seated in the middle of the front seat of the speeding car that Trooper Hayes said he understood was driven by Phillip Wesley Gaunce, 19, of the Old Paris Road, Millersburg. A third person in the car, a 17-year-old girl, is a brother of the other Gaunce youth. The brothers were reported as being seriously injured.

According to Trooper Hayes, he was checking out a car at a service station on the Paris side of the Millersburg Road, just outside of Millersburg, when Nicholas County Sheriff-Elect Reese Snood, now a deputy, drove up and said he was searching for a 1967 Chevrolet that had allegedly been involved in a hit-and-run mishap in Carlisle. Trooper Hayes said as the two were talking

Snood saw the car go by, heading toward the highway going to Millersburg, from the Buddies Mills-Millersburg Road. The trooper said the car was traveling at normal speed at the time. He got in his cruiser to seek to apprehend the vehicle for Deputy Snood.

He said he followed the car through Millersburg and that he passed the old toll house on U.S. 60 beyond Millersburg in Nicholas county he put on his blue light, which caused the car to speed up.

Trooper Hayes said he followed the car

at speeds of up to 110 miles an hour for 2.7 miles—but at that point the car went out of control approaching a curve, traveling about 200 feet along the right side of the highway, striking a guard rail, then went airborne for another 60 to 70 feet and slammed into a tree about 30 feet from the ground, dropping into a creek.

The officer said David Gaunce somehow fell out of the car before it went airborne and was found lying at the side of the highway next to the guard rail.

Phillip Gaunce and Hatten were hurled about 70 feet from the point where the car struck the tree trunk and landed beside each other, Trooper Hayes said.

All were taken to the Nicholas County Hospital where Hatten was pronounced dead on arrival, death being attributed to a crushed skull, with other injuries including a fractured jaw and a severe scalp laceration.

The Gaunce brothers were brought to the Bourbon County Hospital where David was admitted for treatment of multiple injuries.

His brother, Phillip, was rushed on to the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, where he was reported in serious condition, suffering from a severe concussion and scalp lacerations, among other injuries, Trooper Hayes said.

The trooper said two wreckers were required to pull the wrecked car from the scene and that the motor fell out as it was being pulled on, being demolished by the impact.

Trooper Hayes said the accident happened at 1:28 a.m. and that when the car was first spotted the occupants were returning from taking a companion, Billy Columbia, to his home on the Buddies Mills-Millersburg Road.

Young Hatten was a native of Bourbon county, the son of James Harry Hatten Sr. and Annette Platt Hatten.

He attended the Jewellville Christian Church.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by a brother, Jerry Lee Hatten, and a sister, Kathy Ann Hatten, both of the home.

Funeral services were conducted at 1 p.m. Monday at the E.E. Pruitt and Son Funeral Home in Millersburg, with the Rev. Curtis Jones officiating. Burial in the Millersburg Cemetery.
