

FROZEN FRUIT SALAD
I can crushed pineapple
1 can cherry pie filling
1 can sweetened condensed milk
1 large container of whipped topping
Mix all ingredients together and pour into two pans for freezing. This will serve 12.
You may also use this for a dessert. If you do, serve in sherbet glasses and add a bit of whipped topping and a red or green cherry.—Mrs. Ina Biraly

CREAM CHEESE CAKE
6 eggs, beaten until frothy
1 lb. in pkg. of cream cheese
2 sticks of margarine
2 cups sugar
2 cups vanilla
2 cups flour
2 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
In large bowl cream margarine and sugar, add sifted cream cheese. Add eggs, vanilla, then the remaining ingredients beating well until well creamed and smooth. Bake 25 degrees for about 1 hour. Except for beating the eggs, everything is done in one big bowl. Clean-up time is nil. "This cake is like a melted marshmallow baked in a tube pan."—M.D.G.

1 can green peas, drained

1 cup chopped celery
1 cup finely diced green pepper
1 jar pimiento, cut in pieces
1 can sliced water chestnuts
