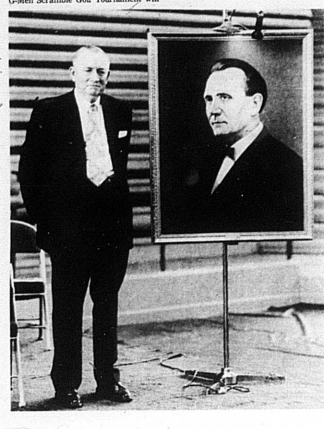


Georgetown homecoming scheduled Oct. 13

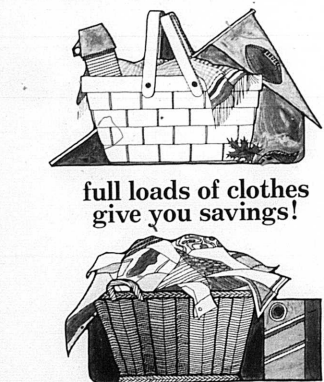

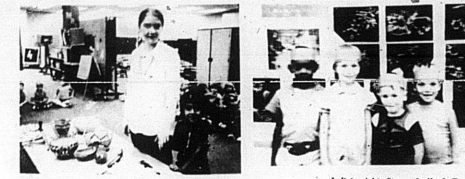

Most of the oil in seafood is polyunsaturated, which many doctors believe acts to reduce blood cholesterol and discourage heart attacks. You'd think that well over 200 varieties are sold in the United States! Many people have never heard of some of the fish available and so the price for these remains relatively inexpensive. Prices vary according to the season, the section of the country and the species. (We have a best-buy chart in next week's column.) So to get the best bargains - and incidentally to live up your government - be open-minded and adventurous! Don't be afraid to try something new. In the words of a prominent home economist: "If you come on an unfamiliar type of fish in your market, ask what it is and what it offers. Changes are your life!" For instance, if you're eating cod, flounder, halibut, ocean catfish, pollock. If you live in the South try mullet and croaker in the West try ling cod and rock sole; in the East try something new.
