Nicholas County beats Mercer County 14-6

Last Friday night proved a satisfying journey for the local football team. They invaded Harrodsburg and overpowered the Mercer County "Scotties" for their second victory of the season. Pumbled and the inability to come up with the big play proved frustrating to both teams in the first half as they battled to a scoreless tie.

The Bluejackets camped flat the door of the Mercer County goal line for the entire third quarter. Joe Wilson finally carried it in on a beautiful 23 yard jaunt around right end evading several tacklers along the way. Roy Fryman carried in for the

extra point and a 6-0 lead. The local griders came right back as J.B. Ritchie intercepted a pass within the shadow of boy dirt and Fryman carried it in from the two. The extra point attempt failed and Nicholas County led 14-0.

A 14 yard kickoff gave Mercer County excellent field position and they took advantage of it and used a 20 yard pass completion enroute before Eddie Hudson ran it over from the 15. Harold Massey blocked the conversion attempt. Defensive play highlighted the game and Gray Hudson accounted for 12 tackles and repeatedly damped the opponent's quarterback for losses. Harold Massey, J.B. Ritchie, and Damon Booth had eight tackles each. Reid also blocked two punts and gave those Nicholas County fans who made the trip a treat just watching his sterling play. Kenneth Simons made diving defensive play breaking up a long pass that would have gone all the way. Marshall Fryman, Jeff Rowe, and Ernie Jones clogged up the middle all night long forcing the Scotties to take to the air. Roy Fryman carried a staggering 38 times amassing 188 yards and Joe Wilson carried 23 times for 89 yards.

Quarterback Joe Huddell was content to stay on the ground and chip away at Mercer County until their defense crumbled.

A happy group of young men returned to Nicholas County last Friday night. The football team deserves your support. This Friday is Homecoming as the Bluejackets host Mayville. Come out and support your team in the last game of the year.

provide special books or programs that allow the children to continue growing—your child is having a learning problem (can't keep up with the rest of the class), there are special teachers and materials available to spend extra time helping your child learn—your child has a problem (doesn't like school; can't get along with other children, etc.); in these a full-time school counselor or psychologist available in the building to help—she or she feels the teacher evaluation policy is fair and a help to better teaching?—there is enough time to spend with each individual child?—every child has textbooks of his or her own; or must books be shared?—there is enough equipment and supplies available for good teaching (movie projectors, tape recorders, science lab equipment, ballistics machines, paper, art materials, etc.)?—the teacher has a clear idea of how to help in taking attendance, correcting papers, supervising playgrounds, and so on, to allow the teachers to teach?—is he able to decide what he teaches and the best way to teach?—ASK YOUR CHILD'S PRINCIPAL IF...—the school has a full-time nurse on

Two Constitutional Amendments published for voter decision

Two Constitutional Amendments will be listed on the November ballot. You, the voter, must decide whether to vote "yes" or "no" on these Amendments. The following is a synopsis of the two Amendments.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #1
1. Abolish the elective office of Superintendent of Public Instruction and provide for the election of a State Board of Education, consisting of seven

members whose terms of office shall be four years and whose duties and qualifications shall be prescribed by law. One member shall be elected on a nonpartisan ballot from each of seven districts established by law. Terms of such will be staggered. Beginning the first Monday in January, 1976, the State Board shall appoint a Superintendent of Public Instruction to act as executive officer—salary and allowances may be

fixed by the Board. Board may remove superintendent for cause prescribed by law.

2. Permit sheriffs to succeed themselves or act as deputies for succeeding terms.

3. Abolish elective offices of Railroad Commissioner and provide, by general law, for the necessary regulation and supervision of railroads operating within the Commonwealth, and on the expiration of the terms of the commissioners elected in 1971, for the exercise of any authority granted in this Constitution to "The Railroad Commission."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #2
1. Legislators must have been a resident in District two years instead of one.

2. Legislators to convene each year the first Tuesday after first Monday in January except following gubernatorial election, when it shall convene on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in March.

3. No session beyond 65 days (does not have to be consecutive) or longer than four months except with two-thirds approval of Senate and House, may extend to six months.

Senator Walter Dee Huddleston has invited all Western Kentuckians to attend a one-day conference with his staff in Paducah on Oct. 22, beginning at 10 a.m. at Paducah City Hall.

"I want to make myself and my Senate staff available to anyone who might have problems we can help them with," Huddleston said. "Also we will be interested to hear from any and all citizens who want to voice their views about any issue before the Congress."

Start year Head Start programs are in operation in six counties: Robertson, Menifee, Mason, Bracken, Nicholas, and Montgomery. Summer programs will operate in both Fleming and counties.

Two-hundred forty pre-school children and their families will receive services in the Fall-Start program, and 200 in Summer Head Start.

Virginia K. Jones was named as Head Start Director by Mr. Perkins at the September Board Meeting to replace Mrs. Eleanor Talbert who resigned.
