He taught in Fayette County school systems for 16 years, retiring in 1971; prior to that, he taught in the Perry County and Jenkins school systems where he served as principal. He was a life member of the National Educational Association and the National Retired Teachers. He was a member of the Park United Methodist Church where he taught Sunday School for 14 years, and was former president of the Park United Methodist Men. He graduated from Carlisle High School, Wesleyan College, and the University of Kentucky. Also, he was past president of the Thoroughbred Kiwanis Club, past counselor of Bluegrass Council B United Commercial Travelers, and former president of the Kentucky Mountain Club. He was a member of the Civil War Round Table, a Navy veteran of W.W. II, a member of Kentucky Historical Society and Phi Delta Kappa. He received the Freedom Foundation Medal Award in 1964 and was recipient of the Thoroughbred Kiwanis Club Man of the Year Award in 1970. He was former chairman of the Board of the Wesleyan Foundation at Eastern University, a member of the American Legion, Scottish Rite Mason, and Olekia Shrine Temple. He worked in many civic activities in Lexington and was presently serving as president of Bluegrass Retired Teachers Association.

A Carlisle native, W.B. Griffin was featured in the Lexington Herald, Sunday edition, as the brother of Miss Halley Griffin and Mrs. Gladys Bobb of Carlisle.

Mr. Griffin has spent most of a lifetime collecting circus and train memorabilia which he houses at his home 1929 Hart Road, Lexington. He owns a 78 RPM album which is rare as circus music goes, the first Merle Evans Circus music album. It is unique in that it carries a played along with the hand. It has collected several thousand recordings of circus music.

He was able to find trombone in the Carlisle High School band, which was innocent enough until the Rhoda Royall Circus came to Carlisle and bandleader Buck Atwater asked him to sit in with the circus band. From this experience he never recovered, from then on he felt belonged to the circus.

As years passed and his insurance business grew, so did both his friendship with various circus personalities and his record collection.
