County fire calls answered

Woody Wilson, Fire Chief of Nicholas County Volunteer Fire Department, reports that two calls were answered, one Sunday and one Monday night in the county.

Sunday, around 7:30 p.m., a blaze started in a cottage belonging to Cecil Murray in Section C, Lake Carnico, where Murray made their home. Cause of the fire is believed to be a defective furnace control, with complete loss of cable and controls.

Monday a barn and 100 stripped sticks of tobacco were lost in a fire which started around 7:00 p.m. The barn is located on the Oz-Row Road on a farm belonging to James Neal Wood. The tobacco belonged to George Sexton who lives on the farm. Tobacco was being stripped in the barn and the fire started while the men were eating dinner. Cause is attributed to the stripping room stove. Both losses were partially covered by insurance.

Carlisle makes All-Kentucky City presentation

Carlisle was one of 15 cities in District 6 to make it's All-Kentucky City presentation last week in Lexington.

There are a total of 15 districts in the state.

Jimmie Hall, co-chairman of the Carlisle-Nicholas County Chamber of Commerce entry, said Tuesday that he has not yet been informed as to whether Carlisle will be eligible to enter the State competition in December. To be eligible to go to the State competition, a city must obtain at least two excellences in each of four categories in the district.

Carlisle entered seven categories: Natural Resources, Industrial, Commercial, Recreational and Cultural, Education, Public Health, and Ecological.

District 6 judges were Dr. Paul Warner, UK Community Development Specialist; Roy Thompson, Kentucky Utilities, Somerset; and Gerald Osborne, Executive Assistant, Department of Commerce, Frankfort. Other officials present at the Lexington judging were Dan Stewart, Kentucky Utilities, Lexington, and chairman of the Kentucky Chamber All-Kentucky City Contest; and Mack Woolam, Kentucky Utilities, Danville, and All-Kentucky City photographer.

Representing Carlisle and answering questions at the judging besides Hall were committee members Mrs. David Zachary, Mrs. Joseph H. Conley and Mrs. Andrew R. Hamon.

A slide presentation was shown at the judging in conjunction with the All-Kentucky City book which the local committee has been compiling since May.

ASC mails 1973 Marketing cards

The 1973 Marketing Cards have been mailed to reach most farmers by Nov. 1. Eugene Letcher, chairman, ASC Committee, stated today. Farmers should check each card they receive with very carefully. "If any errors are noted, they should immediately contact the county office," Mr. Letcher further stated.

All cards have been mailed except on those farms that are not selling or leasing tobacco and have a "Lease Only" card, on those farms that have recently had a change of farm name, and on those farms where a DDT or TDE use certification has not been filed. If a farmer has not received his marketing card by Nov. 8, he should contact the ASCS Office.
