If Watergate had done nothing else, it has drawn attention to the need to put some limits on the amount of money that individuals and groups can give to political candidates...

Some of the major provisions are:
*Creation of a Federal Election Commission to regulate and enforce campaign spending laws.

*Limitation on cash contributions to \$500 per year.
*Limitation on cash contributions to \$200 per year.
*Requirement that the name, address and profession of everyone who contributes \$500 or more be made public.

Next week, the so-called "equal time" provision for radio and television stations would be suspended for Presidential, vice-presidential and congressional races.

The whole thrust of the bill which we passed was to attempt to guarantee that federal elections in this country are not for sale to the highest bidder.
