**FARM & HOME**

Nicholas county farmers are about ready to start filling silos. In order to insure high quality silage feed, there are several points to be considered: time to harvest; fineness of crop; type of storage and; additives used.

Time of harvesting perhaps is the most important decision that one must make in making top quality silage. The grain should be firmly dented and the bottom blades turning brown at the stalk.

If adequate nitrogen is available, an increase in the amount that you can get into a silo, will also help the keeping quality. Cutting length between 1 1/2 and 1 3/8 inch will increase storage capacity from seven to 10 percent over coarse chopped silage.

Type of storage has little effect on quality of silage as long as a good job of chopping, parking and sealing has been done. Good silage or poor silage can be made in a metal, concrete or trench silo. The quality of feed going in, stage of maturity and method of filling are the important factors.

Environment—will also be a major problem. The quality of the environment continues to be one of the major concerns of the American citizen. Dr. George E. Smith, of the University of Missouri, is one of the leading national authorities investigating the effects of agriculture on our environment.

If adequate nutrients stand, and moisture is provided, corn yields will be 150 bushels per acre, over half of carbon dioxide will be removed and seven to ten tons of oxygen are released into the atmosphere.

"An average adult requires about two pounds of oxygen per day. At that rate, one acre of 100 bushels corn produces enough oxygen in a year for 12 people. If fertilization is increased to boost that yield to 150 bushels, that acre will release enough oxygen for 18 people for a year. Can any other industry make such claims for cleaning up the environment?"

The case against agriculture and agricultural chemicals is a flimsy one. The word "pesticide" refers to fertilizers, lime and pesticides are absolutely essential in maintaining the quality of our environment.
