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preference for duck or goose hunting. A fee of \$5 per day per hunter or \$15 per pit must be enclosed. Only cashiers' checks, certified checks or money orders will be accepted. Failure to comply with any of the above will result in return of the reservation application without action.

Hunters will be limited to five hunts per season with no more than two Saturdays. However, a hunter who has had five hunts may still hunt on a standby, first-come, first served basis provided that there is a cancellation of a previously made reservation.

Goose hunting on the Area opens Dec. 1 and continues through Jan. 30, while duck hunting will open Dec. 12 and continue through Jan. 20. There will be no Area or Christmas Day shooting on the Area and shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until 12 noon.

Selections for reservations will be made by random drawings at the Area and will begin Sept. 11 and continue until all available spaces are filled. Money of unsuccessful applicants will be returned and confirmation of reservations should be completed within 20 to 25 days after the start of the drawing.

Parents Day program

Eastern Kentucky University will honor the parents of its students Saturday, Sept. 29, with a special Parents Day program. Parents attending the day's events will see a Band Day parade and concert at Hanger Field and the EKU-Austin Peay football game. They will be guests at receptions and open houses in various dormitories.

Full-time students may purchase football tickets for their parents and their families in advance at half price in upper deck sections of the Breyler Building. All tickets sold at the gate will be at the regular price.

A Parents Day special lunch will be served at half price at campus cafeterias.

The program will provide an opportunity for EKU students to bring their parents and relatives to the campus for the Band Day activities, featuring about 50 high school bands.

Academic and students affairs departments at the University will sponsor counseling sessions for the parents from 11 a.m. until noon in the Powell Building.

The Band Day parade will start at 10 a.m. and luncheon will be served at campus food service facilities beginning at noon.

The pre-game show at Hanger Field will start at 1:30 p.m. and the football game kickoff will be at 2 p.m. The receptions are set for 4:30 p.m. and the open houses from 4:30 to 6 p.m.

MSU to celebrate 50th anniversary

Morehead State University starts its second half century this month and a two-day program will mark the occasion. In addition to saluting MSU's 50 years as a state institution, the observance on Sept. 22 and 23 also will pay tribute to the Morehead Christian Normal School and the work of Mrs. Cora Wilson Stewart, founder of Rowan county's famed "Moonlight Schools."

MSU President Adron Doran announced that the University has acquired a one-room school building which is being restored as a "Moonlight Schoolhouse" to honor Mrs. Stewart's fight against adult illiteracy and MSU's international reputation in adult education research.

Sunday, Sept. 23, will be the 50th anniversary of MSU's opening. The school was founded in 1923 but did not officially open its doors until 1925. The campus was used by the Christian Normal School from 1887 until 1922.

Turned the observance is "Morehead State University in Retrospect and In Prospect." Activities have been arranged to emphasize MSU's athletic heritage on Saturday, Sept. 22, and the past, present and future of the total post, present and future of the total post, present and future of the total post.

"The program planned for these two days will highlight the progress and the contributions these institutions of higher education have made to the region and the prospects which the future holds for greater service," President Doran said.

Events on Sept. 22 include opening of MSU's Eagle Hall of Honor, luncheon for all sports participants and former coaches and cheerleaders, dedication of John (Sonny) Allen Baseball Field and a football game between MSU and Middle Tennessee.

Activities on Sept. 23 start with a university-wide convocation for persons involved with the Christian Normal School and the University's past and present students, faculty and members of the Board of Regents. Also planned is a concurrent reception and an "open house" at the "Moonlight Schoolhouse" which has been erected on the MSU campus.

More details will be announced shortly.
