William D. Crawford, promotion manager of WLWC TV-4 since March 1970, has been named to the newly established position of Administrative Assistant for Communications with the Synod of the Covenant, United Presbyterian Church in the USA, located at 3406 North High Street in Columbus.

Crawford will be responsible for the development and maintenance of the systematic communications program among the various synod structures, with the national agencies of the Church's General Assembly, and with ecumenical organizations and the public media within the synod boundaries, which encompasses Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky.

Crawford is a native of Carlisle and attended the University of Kentucky and the University of Maryland. He has been involved in the Communications industry for more than 20 years, primarily in

broadcast journalism and promotion/publicity.

Wolf cattle sale returns \$388,300

Eighty-one lots of Maine Anjou were sold for a total of \$388,300 Saturday, Sept. 15, by Harry H. Wolf Jr.'s Heaven 11 Farms located in Nicholas County. The sale was the first sale held at the Kentucky Training Center in Lexington.

The highest lot was a 4/8 pure Maine Anjou heifer which sold for \$12,300. The average price given per lot at the sale was \$4,794.

Buyers came from Kentucky, Indiana,

Texas, Michigan, Colorado, Montana, Kansas and the Canadian provinces of Alberta and Prince Edward Island. The largest number of buyers, 11, were from Texas.

The Maine Anjou breed of cattle has the highest record of beef conversion in the United States. It is very resistant to pink eye and foot rot, and is easy to calf. The largest state organization in the country for this breed is Kentucky.

U.S. District Court to hear teacher suit

Judge H. David Hernandez of U.S. District Court, Lexington, will hear the case of four Nicholas County teachers vs. the Nicholas County Board of Education starting on Tuesday, Sept. 25, at 4 p.m. The case is scheduled to continue for three days beginning at 10 a.m. each day.

The four, Mrs. Kathy Hanson, David J. Piersol, Thomas Metcalfe and Mrs. Angela A. Nolans, filed the suit June 27 charging that their teaching contracts would not be renewed as punishment for their activities as officers and members of the Nicholas County Education Association (NCEA) and the Kentucky Education Association (KEA).

The plaintiffs also assert that they are being punished for "their support of a civil lawsuit brought by Mrs. Hanson against the board in which she was awarded a monetary judgment in Nicholas Circuit Court last year."

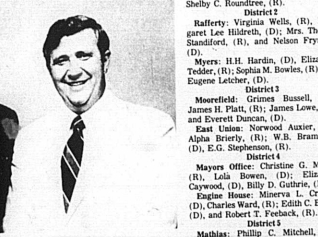
