POLITICAL GRANDSTANDING
When U.S. Sen. "Sonny" Jackson recently demanded a rollback of crude oil prices, it occurred to me that the public might well vote for a rollback of congressional salaries in the case of legislators who make a career of grandstanding.

Sen. Jackson, for example, has been grandstanding for months on the oil situation. It apparently doesn't occur to him to ask the basic question: How much does it cost to find a barrel of new oil? He is all for slashing prices without investigating costs.

But Sen. Jackson is not the only offender. The silly senator in Congress seems to last year-around. Much silliness has been voiced regarding proposals that the President resign.

These proposals show a shocking ignorance of the U.S. constitutional system.

The liberals who call for the President's resignation say that he has "lost the confidence" of the American people.

But that is as may, a loss of confidence is not sufficient cause for a presidential resignation. One cannot help wondering how George Washington would have fared in a poll after Valley Forge or Abraham Lincoln following the disaster at Bull Run.

Those liberals who hammer at the "loss of confidence" theme in effect proposed government by "Nichols" rating. If that is what they want, they owe it to the public to propose a constitutional amendment to the effect that the President may be impeached for "treason, bribery, or a palpable decline in the public opinion polls." But that isn't the lay of the land at this time.

Those liberals who push this theory may find themselves the victims of their own line. A recent Harris Poll indicated that the American people have less confidence in Congress than they do in the President. Would the proponents of the "loss of confidence" theory want the 3rd Congress to resign en masse to restore public trust in the Legislative Branch? I think not.

From time to time, we hear talk about the British parliamentary system and how Mr. Nixon would not have survived under that system. But few commentators point out that every member of Parliament stands for election at the same time as the Prime Minister. If a British-style election were held today, Mr. Nixon might lose. But many proponents of western credits for the Soviet Union, rationing, renewed diplomatic ties with Castro's Cuba, and high spenders also might be turned off of office.

As a general matter, Americans aren't about to adopt the British parliamentary system or government by "Nichols" rating. But the political spicing undoubtedly will continue. The country can stand a great deal of political spicing, but congressional nonsense of economic issues is something else.

The same crowd that is talking

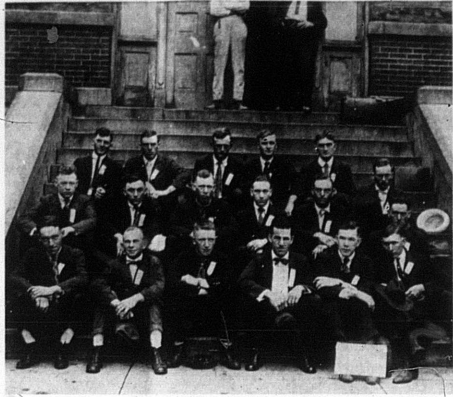
presidential "resignation" also is pushing hard for rationing, nationalization of private business and other disastrous economic actions. These economic subjects in Congress could shut down our free economy. They already are responsible for many of the shortages the nation faces. They don't understand, as John Kerry pointed out recently in the Oklahoma, that "nearly 31 per cent of all farms doing less than \$50 million a year in business—and nearly 46 per cent of larger farms—have reduced output of goods or services in the past year alone because of controls." Yet the liberals in Congress want more controls! Truly, the congressional liberals represent a disaster lobby.

Bond sales up

Total statewide sales of Series E and H Bonds during February were \$1,396,356, the highest sales on record for any one month since the H Bond was introduced in 1952. It was the first month since that time that sales exceeded the \$1 million mark.

February sales of Series E and H Savings Bonds in Nicholas county were \$1,828, including cumulative sales for 1974 to \$5,444.

Statewide cumulative sales for the current year reached \$12,872,024 or 17.9% of the 1974 goal of \$77,600,000. Sales for the same period in 1973 were \$11,546,726.

USDA publishes energy checklist

"Just because more oil looks to be headed our way does not mean the fuel shortage is over," says Paul E. Hall, Executive Director of the Nicholas County ASCS Office. According to Hall, "Conservation of expensive fuel remains a must." In fact, he says, "The Federal Energy Office requires farmers to certify to their fuel suppliers that they have a fuel conservation program in effect."

To help conservation efforts and to help with quick certification, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the Federal Energy Office and the Environmental Protection Agency, has developed a 20-point checklist. Hall explains that items of the checklist, there's a certificate that farmers can sign, date, and give to their fuel suppliers as their certification.

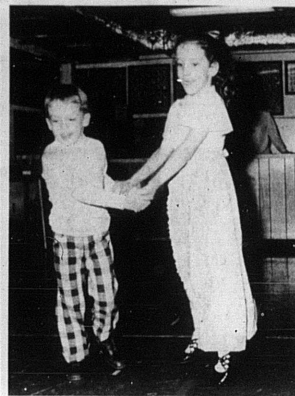
Certification is uncomplicated, Hall says. All a farmer has to do is certify that he has an energy Conservation Program in effect in his farming operation and that he will use all priority fuels which he receives for agricultural purposes only. The farmer simply signs and dates this statement and gives it to his fuel supplier.

The Nicholas County Office has advance copies of the Conservation Checklist. Farmers wishing to obtain a copy and certify early can come to the county ASCS Office and do so.

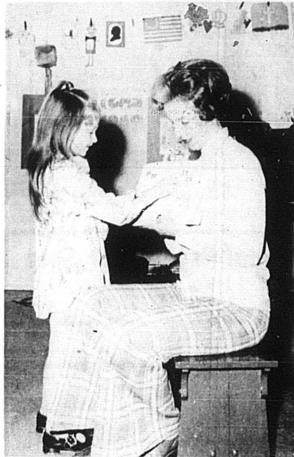

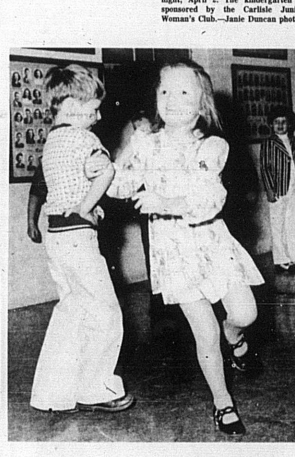
