### 1975-crop wheat allotment told

A 1975 National wheat allotment of 53.5 million acres was proclaimed today by Acting Secretary of Agriculture, Clayton K. Yeutter. The allotment does not represent a limit on the amount of wheat that may be planted. It is used solely to determine what payments would be made to wheat growers if the National average market price for wheat during July-November 1975 falls below \$2.06 a bushel.

For 1974-crop wheat, the National average allotment was established at 55.9 million acres and farmers are expected to plant nearly 71 million acres. Acres planted to wheat are expected to exceed the allotment again in 1975, the average of wheat sown will likely be significantly influenced by the price outlook for wheat at planting time.

Legislation requires that the Secretary of Agriculture, not later than April 15 each year, proclaim a National wheat allotment for the crop to be harvested in the next calendar year. Full details of the 1975 Wheat Program will be announced later.

## Sen. Huddleston urges tax law simplification

WASHINGTON—Declaring that "one of my great disappointments after my first year here has been the almost total lack of effort by the Congress to make our income tax system more equitable," Senator Walter "Dee" Huddleston joined with Senator Edmund Muskie and others in a Senate floor colloquy on tax reform to examine and find ways to alleviate this problem.

Senator Huddleston hit hard upon the incredible complexity of the tax system which he feels produces "an inherent unfairness."

"I think it is a national disgrace that we have created an income tax system so confusing that a virtual industry has come into being just to help the hapless taxpayer decipher the laws under which he is expected to voluntarily pay his taxes," Huddleston said.

"Even with professional help, adding extra expense to the taxpayer, there is no assurance that his return will be in compliance. For no matter how expert the accountant, how astute the attorney, there is no way he can be sure that his interpretation will be the same as an agent of the Internal Revenue Service or of a tax court in his particular part of the country."

The Kentucky Democrat charged that the complexity of the system lends itself to "exploitation by some while victimizing others."

"Those in high income brackets with a variety of sources of income are frequently able to avoid sizeable tax liability. Many with limited resources and income who have tried to comply with the law often find themselves assessed for additional tax after a check by an I.R.S. agent and are constrained to pay without further adjudication out of fear or from an unwillingness to risk the legal fee and the additional penalty and interest."

When concluding, Huddleston urged both the House and Senate when they begin deliberations on tax reform—hopefully this year—to give a great deal of attention to the need for tax law simplification and fair and even

application of the law. The law that is not understandable, that is subject to many interpretations, that cannot be administered equally to all can only ill serve the citizens of our country."
