

Agree or Not

Frankfort—Governor Wendell H. Ford whisked the 1974 General Assembly out of more power for the governor's office than any governor in recent history.

That power comes from the legislature granting him the authority to allocate surplus funds at his discretion. The only restriction is that he must notify the Interim Legislative Appropriations and Revenue Committee. Already he has allocated more than \$75 million in surplus funds above and beyond budget estimates, and he still has another \$50 million or more to apportion as he pleases.

The reason the governor gave in asking for this power in his budget message was the uncertainty of the economy and tax income for the two-year budget. He reminded the gasoline shortage scars was on, and there was skepticism about federal revenue sharing funds, as it turns out, the tax revenue is rolling in rather well, and the surplus at the end of the fiscal year, June 30, was more than anticipated.

Legislators of both parties are more than mildly upset about the huge surplus revealed at the end of the fiscal year, and many are wondering why in the world did we give the governor this much authority?

Under our system of government the legislature appropriates the money and the administrative branch of govern-

ment (the governor) spends the money designated for programs approved by the legislature.

House Minority Leader Harold DeMarco said last week, "I tried to get an amendment on this thing so the governor would have to get approval of the interim committee, which he could have easily done, to spend the money."

Now, some of the more seasoned members of the legislature are wondering if the 1976 legislature will give the next governor this same authority. There is really no quarrel about how to govern, but many legislators are concerned that they gave away their constitutional rights to appropriate and designate the spending of revenue.

The governor has allocated most of the money, so far, to capital projects, and the governor tax dollars to judiciously use to promote his candidacy for the U.S. Senate against Republican Marlow Cook.

The Republicans, particularly, are wondering if he won't put the additional \$50 million in strategic places in late September and October in places calculated to gain him votes for the State Senate seat.

While coal-county legislators feel they won a victory in getting surplus severance tax dollars, above the budget estimate, distributed among the counties on the basis of production, they are now beginning to wonder what the next governor will put in his budget as an estimate of this revenue. 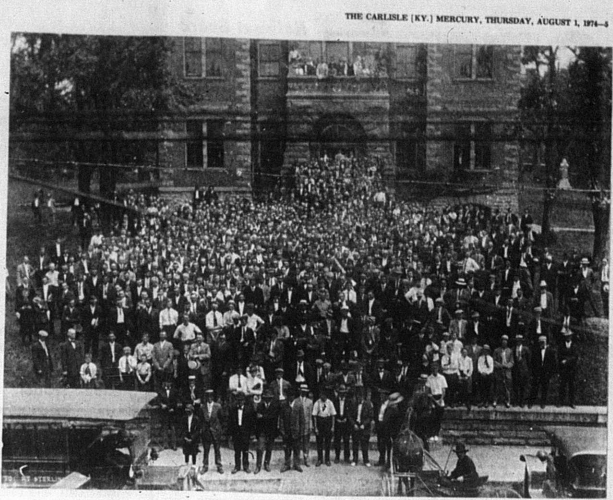
