### Wayne Shumate celebrates 10th anniversary

On Monday, Aug. 12, Wayne Shumate, president of Blue Grass Industries and Knitting, Inc., was honored with gifts and flowers from personnel and civic leaders for his successful completion of 10 years as chief administrator of the company.

Shumate took over as president Aug. 12, 1964. At that time personnel totaled 344 both in Carlisle and Mt. Sterling. As of this date in 1974, there are six plants in five cities with approximately 3,300 people employed.

Besides the two plants in Carlisle and one each in Mt. Sterling, Cynthiana, Paris, a new training center was opened in Mayville in the fall of 1973. A new 71,000 sq. ft. building is under construction on a site next to the Mayville Community College.

Shumate took time out of the day to visit the personnel, thanking them for their fine cooperation during the past 10 years.

## President Ford addresses Congress and the Nation

Gerald R. Ford Jr., became the 38th President of the United States at noon on Friday, Aug. 9, 1974 following the resignation of President Richard Nixon, announced Thursday, Aug. 8, becoming effective at 11 a.m. EDT Friday.

President Ford made his first address to Congress on Monday, Aug. 12 and received the longest ovation to be heard "for many years" in the House Chamber where he served 25 years before his appointment to the vice-presidency October 12, 1973. He is the first American President not

To help drivers acquire and maintain the skills and attitudes essential to this job, the Department of Education has for the past 10 summers conducted an intensive school bus driver training program throughout the state.

Training programs cover these areas: traffic laws, State Board of Education regulations that pertain to pupil transportation, first aid, vehicle inspection, emergency procedures and pupil behavior management.

Many people have been asking questions about the family history section of "The History of Nicholas County."

The following guidelines have been established for this section.

1. Family should have been in Nicholas County in 1900 or earlier.
2. History should not be more than two typewritten pages, double spaced.
3. History should be story form.
4. History should be submitted to Mrs. James Noll, the section editor, by Dec. 15, 1974.

A sample of a well-written family history follows. Maybe it will help you in writing yours.

**The Mathias Family**

Joseph Mathias, a shoemaker, was born in 1811 in Eidingen, a village in the German duchy of Baden. He emigrated in 1831 to Chillicothe, Ohio, and married Mary Ann Merkle the next year. Luke Mathias, sixth of eight children, was born in 1848 and opened a cobbler's shop in Covington, Ky. after the Civil War. In 1874 Luke married Mary Harmer, a Covington girl, of Austrian ancestry. Shortly thereafter, Luke and Mary moved to Carlisle upon
