## New city tax

alley from Broadway to Walnut Streets inside G.C. Myers house.  
Dr. Robert Sparks, president of the Recreation Council, asked the city to provide labor to construct the shelter house to be built at the park with sewer and cold water lines. The shelter house will be 30 x 40 with 2 bathrooms and a storage area. It will house around 8 or 10 picnic tables.  
The intrin Recreation Park project must be completed by Dec. 31, or the unused grant money will be lost. Sparks said that the Council could pay for laboring under the railroad and for all supplies. He asked that the city donate the labor only. Council decided to obtain estimates of the cost involved first, but the consensus of opinion was to provide the service to the park.  
At an Aug. 1 called meeting, Council voted to remove the speed bump in Kennedy Heights. A 25 mile speed limit will be enacted on all city streets. At July 22 called meeting, Alex Crawford was elected Mayor-pro tem by unanimous vote.  
The decision was made by Council Monday in mail citations to Police Chief to all property owners who have not cut their weeds. Conviction of this offense can carry a fine of \$10 per day until the weeds are cut.  
City attorney Billy Hopkins, was directed to prepare an ordinance prohibiting parking on the west side of Walnut from Main Street to the railroad. The motion was passed at the July 8 meeting of Council.  
Other decisions included:  
—No city council meetings be held

without the presence of the city attorney.  
To run the sewer line to the remnants of Oma Steele.  
To advertise for bids to clean Runby Park Creek. Bids to be in City office by 7 p.m. Friday, Aug. 23.  
To pay Lester Sapp and Berry overtime pay.  
To hire J.W. Ector to mow the far side of the City Lake.  
To install a No Parking sign in front of K&A emphasize the yellow line already there.  
Building permits were granted:  
Fred Creasey to build two homes on Catherine Street. Teddy Shaw to build a home on Eastern Ave.; John Anderson to build a carport on Sycamore; and Oliver Berry to build a metal storage building on E. Main.  
Two time certificate interest checks for \$627.75 each were deposited to the city operating account.
