C.H.S. Class '44 reunion set

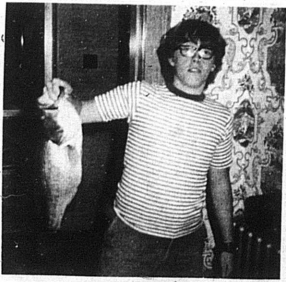

During the conference a model child care facility was in operation for teachers to observe techniques and equipment used with pre-schoolers.

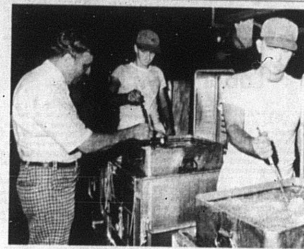

Co-op draws crowd for its annual meet

Hubert Cecil Duncan and Lovell Bob Livingston were elected to the local Board of Directors at the Southern States annual membership fish fry held at Carlisle on Aug. 28.

Sam Reynolds was named chairman of the board while Eugene Letcher was picked as vice-chairman.

Elected to the local Southern States Farm Home Advisory Committee were: Mrs. Ralph Brookshire and Mrs. Fred Jones.

Mrs. Clay Fryman was chosen as chairman of the Farm Home Advisory Committee while Mrs. Paul Tinscher was named secretary.

William Dampier was chosen as a delegate to represent the local membership at the Southern States Cooperative's 31st Annual Stockholders Meeting in Richmond, Va., on Nov. 13.

Bill Fine of Lexington, a regional staff representative of Southern States Cooperative, is reporting on the overall

operations of the co-op for the fiscal year ended June 30, told the session that volume was over \$17 million and that it would pay a 2.6% dividend on patron purchases for the year. He pointed out that a number of steps taken by the co-op during the past fiscal year "helped farmers in the past states year facing a catastrophic supply problem."

These included such things as: (1) keeping fertilizer plants open and shipping last fall when it was evident that prices were going to be higher later on; (2) in spite of shortages of key raw materials in farm supplies, the co-op was able to furnish members about 22% more farm supplies after discounting for price increases; (3) in feed, co-op was one of the few feed manufacturers which failed to ship a single ton of feed due to lack of diacalcium phosphate and other phosphate materials; (4) The co-op's seed department was able to supply
