# Kay's Kitchen

Looking over past columns written for special occasions, and consider Valentine's Day pretty special, maybe I am just a romantic at heart, I selected the most wonderful Standing Rib roast, Sirloin tip or Ribs roast. With the price of meat as it is today, I simply have not the heart, nerve or what ever to even suggest serving such a cut of meat. However we need not forget the good things a special meal and get together. Make your favorite meat loaf and during the last 15 minutes of baking time place biscuits, cut in heart shapes, on top and bake until brown - or baked hash, topped with the biscuits.

Don't forget the red candles - a plenty of them, for festive spirit and to conserve energy. We are at that time of year when your spirit needs a lift.

Make double use of your own eggs and milk.

**POTATO SOUP**  
 Use 4 cups of moist soup with salt and pepper, mashed potato.

For dessert do purchase two heart shaped cake pans. You can use them not only for Valentine's desserts, but birthdays too.

Bake a white cake, your favorite recipe or mix, and with either Seven Minute Frosting or Baked drop or two of red coloring for a pink tint.

**WHITE CAKE**  
 Sift 1 1/2 cups white sugar. Beat until soft to cup butter or margarine for this cake, butter is best, and sugar gradually and beat until very light and creamy.

Sift before measuring 2 1/2 cups cake flour. Result with 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add these ingredients alternately with 1 cup of milk to the butter and sugar. Continue beating and add 1/2 teaspoon almond extract.

Beat until stiff but not dry 4 egg whites and a pinch of salt. Fold, by hand, lightly into cake batter.

Bake in 2 greased and lightly floured heart shaped pans at 350 degrees about 25 minutes. You may have some batter left. If you do, bake in paper cups set in muffin tin.

This recipe actually calls for two 9 inch pans and I don't think the heart shaped ones are quite that large, at least mine are not.

**SEVEN MINUTE WHITE ICING**  
 Place in top of double boiler and beat until thoroughly blended:  
 2 egg whites  
 1/4 cup sugar  
 3 tablespoons cold water  
 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar or 1/4 teaspoon of white corn syrup

Place these ingredients over rapidly boiling water. Beat constantly for approximately 7 minutes. Remove from heat. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla and continue beating until icing is right consistency to spread.
