Our community extends sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Price whose home and furnishings were destroyed by fire Friday afternoon.



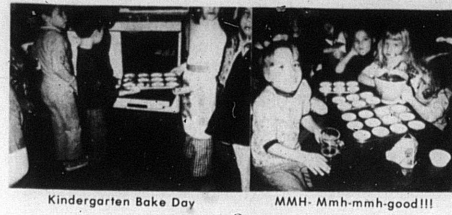

Your local Soil Conservation Service office just received a summary of bulletins on the following subjects: Growing Flowering Annuals; Pruning Shade Trees and Replanting Them; Irrigation; Growing the Flowering Dogwood. These bulletins have some very helpful hints on gardening even if you have been at it for years.

The Soil Conservation Service can give you other help on your garden such as soils and what plants, trees and shrubs you could expect to grow and do well in that particular soil. 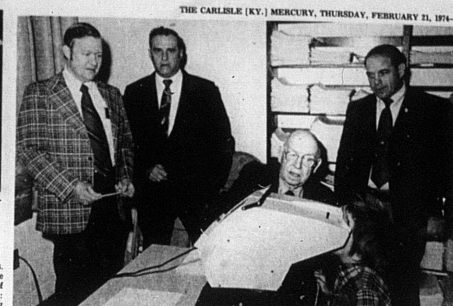
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Paris Lions come to Nicholas Myers
