The game started off with the Jackets and the Devils swapping baskets, until Deming hit a five point scoring streak and went ahead 14-6. Nicholas County fought back, though, and was down by only one point at the end of the quarter, 12-11.

The Bluejackets press paid off in the first part of the second quarter and they took the lead 16-14. That seemed to be as far as they could advance, and the quarter was evenly matched the rest of the way. The quarter ended in a tie, 27 all.

Deming came out hot in the third quarter and pulled ahead of Nicholas County, 36-33. But then Ricky Hicks and Doug Fryman began hitting and pulled the Jackets up with the Deming score tied the game, 35-35. A couple of buckets then put Deming ahead 38-35 at the end of the third.

Deming again started the quarter hot, with a quick pair of baskets and went out 42-35. Nicholas County began scrapping from there and pulled within a single basket, 45-41. But again momentum changed hands and Deming munged changed hands and jumped out, 49-41. From then on the Jackets wouldn't seem to "burr" a basket until Deming's Chandler afforded the Jackets very few second chances at the free throw line, and was down by County on the short side of a 59-49 score.

Ricky Hicks led the Bluejackets in scoring with 30 big ones. Doug Fryman was next with 14, followed by Doug Edwards, 7; Gerald Thompson, 6; Wallace Edwards, 2.

Doug Fryman got six of Nicholas County's 22 rebounds to lead the team in that department. Next was Doug Jones with 15.

The Little League Association would like to thank Meredith Fryman for giving again this year, a free minkabale to each boy who hits a home run in a Little League game.

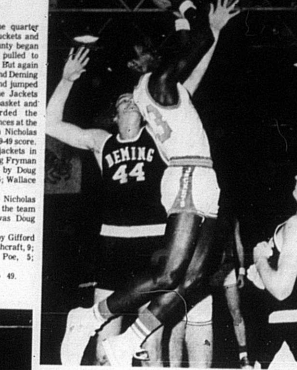
Nicholas plays in 37th District Tourney Friday

Arnold introduces House Bill 367

A bill has been introduced in the state House of Representatives that would allow adoptive parents to recover from wrongful death of their child.

House Bill 367, cosponsored by Rep. Adrian Arnold, D-Mt. Sterling, states that whenever the death of a person results from an injury inflicted because of a wrongful act or negligence of another person, damages may be recovered for the death from the person who caused it.

The bill specifies that any money recovered would go to the kindred of the deceased in a line of descent beginning with the mother and father.

The bill also specifies that if in the event the deceased was an adopted person the "mother" and "father" would mean the adoptive parents of the deceased.
