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## Col. Wilbur Buntin replaces Col. Milburn

Col. Wilbur Buntin has replaced Col. Edward Milburn as commander of the XXIII Corps Artillery, headquartered in Louisville.

Milburn, 51, has become the United States Property and Fiscal Officer for the Kentucky National Guard and will be stationed in Frankfurt.

In his new position, he is in charge of all federal property used by the Kentucky National Guard.

Milburn's military service dates back to 1942 when he served in the U.S. Army in the European Theatre. He has been in the Army or the Guard since that time.

He is a native of Springfield, where he and his wife still reside. The couple has one daughter.

In assuming the post of commander of the XXIII Corps Artillery, Buntin, 52, will retain his position as Deputy Adjutant General of the Kentucky National Guard.

The Colonel served in the Asiatic and Pacific Theaters during World War II and has been in the military for 31 years.

A native of Nicholas county, Buntin is married and has two children. He and his wife reside in Frankfurt.

## February Grand Jury makes official report

The grand jury would like to report as follows: Upon being dismissed from the Court room Monday, Feb. 4, 1974, several members of the grand jury proceeded to Nicholas County Jail to evaluate the needs and conditions of the facility. A request was stated by several members to have marking meters removed from in front of the jail with said area to be designated for use of sheriff's and police cars for unloading prisoners.

Also suggested was the need of an outside entrance into the jail proper, rather than entrance of peace officers with prisoners through the jailer's house. The grand jury also visited

Nicholas County Hospital the morning of Feb. 19, 1974. The facility, we were informed, is very outdated, however, redecorating was in process which improved the appearance but of course has nothing to do with the adequacy of the plant. The need is present for either central air-conditioning or individual units for each room.

The roof has leaked in certain areas since the building was built and still does.

Also noted is the need for a general soap and water, house cleaning of the court house.

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acres of crops he has planted. The final date for sign-up will be determined by the State Committee and will be announced later.

Participation in these commodity programs has been simplified too, Mr. Hall said. There are no acreage requirements, no restrictions on planting for the 1974 crop, and no conserving base requirements through the next four crop years. The duration of the Agriculture and Consumer Protection Act of 1973, Mr. Hall said.

This means that under the 1974 program, farmers will be able to plant as many acres as they want of any crop except tobacco, peanuts and extra long staple (ELS) cotton, which are still under marketing quotas.

Farmers who sign up will be eligible for program payments should payments be required. Under the 1973 act farmers are guaranteed a "target price." For corn it is \$1.38 a bushel and for wheat, \$2.09 a bushel. If the average price for these commodities falls below the target price, the producer receives the difference between the target price and the five-month average price received by all farmers for wheat and feed grains.
