Billy Hopkins appointed city attorney, Chanslor and Wade rehired by acclamation

The new City Council members and Mayor Bill Power were sworn into office Monday night by Joseph H. Cosley, the outgoing City Attorney. The councilmen are Dr. Andy Hamon, Clarence Cord, Alex Crawford, Calvin Wills, Charles Fay and Veach Berry. The first order of business was the appointment of a new City Attorney. Billy Hopkins was hired for the job at \$100 per month. Next the City Clerk Treasurer and Assistant Clerk, Robert Chanslor and Margaret Wade, were rehired by acclamation. Their salaries will be reviewed in July along with all City employees' salaries. Council voted unanimously to hold regular meetings on the second Monday of each month. A letter from Bobby Anderson was

read by Mayor Power asking the City for a \$125 donation to purchase a cannon for permanent display on the courthouse lawn. The Fiscal Court, American Legion, and V.P.W. are also contributing \$125 each. Council, voted 5-0 to donate the money. Dr. Hamon abstained from voting on the motion.

May move police station Council voted 5-1, with Berry voting against the motion, to move the Police Station in the back offices of the City Building until further notice. Discussion of the matter included consideration of building a Police Station on the corner of Main and Locust Streets on the Courthouse corner. Further study will be made concerning this possibility as some

councilmen feel that the Police Station should be located on Main Street.

Dr. Hamon was elected unanimously as Mayor Pro Tem because he was the highest vote getter in the election.

Mayor Power appointed the following standing committees with the first name mentioned being chairman: Fire Department, Building and Lighting—Berry, Fay, Cord; Gas, Streets and Alley—Wills, Crawford, Berry; Water Sewer—Cord, Wills, Crawford; Supplies and Trash—Hamon, Cord and Wills.

The meeting was adjourned until Monday, Jan. 14, at 7 p.m.

Perkins to hold seminar for local officials

Helps newer officials "This seminar will be a help because it will give the newer officials a lot of information, and help them in their work for the people, in their counties and communities. It will also be helpful to our experienced officials, because it will give them an opportunity to talk over problems they are running into, and I hope they will be coming away from the meeting with some answers," Congressman Perkins said.

Cervical cancer clinic Health Center Jan. 23

Cervical cancer, the second leading cause of cancer deaths in women, is potentially curable if caught early enough. It can be detected by having a yearly Pap smear, the simple, painless

test for cervical cancer developed by and named for George N. Papanicolaou, M.D.

So far, 85 percent of the reported cervical cancer cases found by the county health departments have been in the early, potentially curable stages of development, according to the Bureau for Health Services Cancer Program. Due to early detection and prompt treatment deaths from cervical cancer have been cut nationally 50 percent in the last 25 years.

The cancer program estimates that about 20 per cent of Kentucky's women get Pap smears from private physicians, as the program encourages local health departments to try to reach the other 80 per cent.

Cancer experts believe that if all women would get a yearly Pap smear, deaths from cervical cancer would be eliminated.

A Cervical Cancer Clinic will be conducted at the Nicholas County Health Center on Wednesday, Jan. 23 by Dr. J.T. Montford. Hours will be 10 a.m. through 12 noon.
