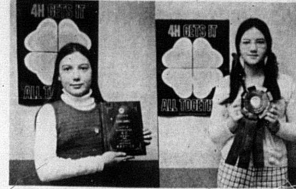

New environmental regulations effective January 11



Deanna Darrell, daughter of Mrs. Willie Ray Darrell, was selected the champion in the 11-year age division at the Area 4-H Tobacco Show and Sale in December. Her crop, which averaged 95.11, received the County Champion Rosette and she was awarded cash award premiums in addition to her crop proceeds. Debbie grew her acre of 441 tobacco on the Sky View Farm, Inc. Bill Gad is manager of the farm.

A new regulation giving the state Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Department strict control over construction and modification of certain types of buildings and highways will become effective Jan. 11, 1974. John Smither, director of air pollution in the environmental agency, said the plan was approved by the governor and the Legislative Research Commission. It will affect the building of any facility that would generate an increase in traffic in urban areas and roads in any county with a community of 20,000 or more people. Airports served by regularly scheduled airlines. An enclosed parking area with a capacity of 750 vehicles or more. Highways in any standard metropolitan area or counties with a community of 20,000 or more people. Any facility, such as a shopping center, that would induce traffic of 2,000 or more vehicles per hour. Smither said there could be some exceptions to the new regulation such as when a developer has undertaken a continuous construction project and the contracts were signed before Jan. 11, 1974. Highway construction may also be exempted, he noted. "Where" land acquisition has already begun. At the present time, the regulation is only concerned with the carbon monoxide level in the area of the proposed development. Smither said, but this may be expanded in the future to include other pollutants.

Kentucky grasslands conference Jan. 15

Partners who will learn the latest information about the production and feeding of alfalfa and usage should plan to attend the Kentucky Grasslands Conference on Jan. 15. The conference is sponsored by the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture and the Kentucky Forage Council. It will take place in the auditorium of the Agricultural Science Center on the UK campus. The morning session, which begins at 9:30 a.m., will focus on alfalfa production and use. Alfalfa is becoming increasingly important as a source of home-grown, high protein feed for cattle, notes J. Kenneth Evans, newly-appointed extension for a specialist at UK. With the development of effective control methods for the alfalfa weevil, Evans foresees much greater production of alfalfa in Kentucky in the years ahead. Evans will open the session on alfalfa by discussing the present alfalfa picture in Kentucky and the outlook for future production. He will be followed by Grant Thomas, UK Professor of Soils, who will talk about land use and fertility as it relates to alfalfa. W.C. Tompkins, UK Professor of Agronomy, will describe alfalfa varieties and management of the crop. Insect pest management, with emphasis on alfalfa weevil control, will be covered by B.C. Pans, chairman of the Department of Entomology at UK. Ron Westland, UK extension dairy specialist, will discuss the feeding of alfalfa. The afternoon session will center on silage production and use. The first speaker will be Kim Wells, UK extension soils specialist, who will talk about land use, fertility and crop for silage. When to harvest silage for quality and volume will be the topic of Brian White, extension forage specialist at Virginia Tech. Roger Henken, Associate Professor of Animal Sciences at UK, will discuss feeding silage to dairy cattle, and Curtis Alabur, UK extension beef cattle specialist, will talk about feeding silage to beef cattle. The session on silage is scheduled to end at 4:00 p.m. and will be followed by a business meeting of the Kentucky Forage Council.

Hutchison becomes junior Angus Association member

John L. Hutchison, Carlisle, has been granted a junior membership in the American Angus Association at St. Joseph, Mo., announced Lloyd D. Miller, executive secretary. This new junior membership entitles the member to register purchased Angus at regular membership rates and to the privileges of the American Angus Association until the age of 21. At that time junior members are eligible to convert to lifetime memberships in the Association. There were 99 young people in the United States to receive junior memberships last month.
