**USDA increases rates for school meal assistance**  
The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) has retroactively increased its reimbursement rates for school meal assistance for the past six months. The increased rates cover meals served under the national school lunch and school breakfast programs and school breakfast programs which were announced by USDA's Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) as another provision of the new child nutrition law passed last month.  
The national average payment to help defray food costs of each lunch that for schools other than those served to participating school children increased from 18 cents to 20 cents. Within that average, states were authorized to vary the rate of reimbursement to individual schools as high as 20 cents for each lunch served free, 18 cents above the program maximum.
