## KINCAID GIVES

### \$100,000 donation to charitable organizations in central Kentucky



Lexington businessman Garville D. Kincaid last week announced plans to make a \$100,000 donation to charitable organizations in Central Kentucky, which could include organizations in Carlsle and Nicholas county.

It is one of the largest such gifts ever made in Fayette county by one individual. Kincaid, himself, contributed \$100,000 to the local YMCA in a building fund drive several years ago.

Announcement of the newest donation was made at a luncheon at the Hospitality Motor Inn.

Kincaid said a committee composed of directors and advisory directors of Central Bank & Trust Co. has been named to review the requests and needs of eligible agencies.

Kincaid is chairman of the board of Central Bank and chief executive officer of several other local business firms, including Kentucky Central Life Insurance.

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Central Kentucky tax-exempt organizations are invited to submit written applications to Central Bank in Lexington. H.A. "Bud" Smith, trust officer of Central Bank, Garville Kincaid and David L. Brain, executive vice president of Kentucky Central Life Insurance are reviewing the announcements.

## Nicholas county to benefit from grant to HCRECC

Eight eastern Kentucky counties including Nicholas county are to be helped by improvement of the Harrison County Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation at Cynthiana which was granted \$34,000 by the Rural Electrification Administration Jan. 10. Senator Marlow Cook has announced in Washington.

Cook said the money would be used to finance service to 350 additional customers and pay for 18 miles of distribution line and an addition to the existing headquarters building, the Senator explained.

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## Local CAP to join Lexington, Fayette (CALF) Feb. 1

The Nicholas County Fiscal Court has approved the transfer of the Community Action Program in Nicholas county from Licking Valley CAP to Community Action Lexington Fayette (CALF) effective Feb. 1. This change was made to provide better services to the poor through closer cooperation with the Bluegrass Area Development District of which Nicholas county is a part.

Nicholas county will have three seats on the Board of Directors of CALF which meets monthly in Lexington. One seat goes to the County Judge or his appointed representative. One seat goes to a representative elected by the poor. The third seat goes to a representative of the private sector—professional, business, industry, religious, social and service organizations, minority groups, etc.

Many volunteers are also needed to help with all parts of the program. The services now offered include the Head Start Program, a community center on the canopy building at the old city school, free materials for sewing needs, arts and crafts with assistance in selling finished products, clothing and emergency food distribution, weekly hot meals and social gatherings for the elderly through the Meals on Wheels program, summer employment for

## Vehicle sticker deadline was Tuesday, Jan. 15

The deadline for purchasing city auto stickers was Tuesday, Jan. 15. Council decided at its adjourned meeting Monday night to emphasize this fact with a public notice today's Mercury.

Citations to not will be the penalty for anyone not properly displaying his stickers.

Notice, too, is being given that unlicensed sticker abandoned cars will be pulled in off of city streets. Both notices were transmitted.

In other notices, Council unanimously decided:

- that Mike Jones prepare specifications by next meeting night for bids to purchase a new city dump truck;
- that the City Attorney, Billy Hopkins, check the legality of overtime exemption for the policemen and any ramifications of private car use by the police; report to be made next meeting night;
- that the policemen be paid time and a half for overtime worked during this pay period;
- that active volunteer firemen be paid \$3.00 per fire run in addition to their present salary of \$12.50 per monthly meeting;
- to purchase the gas tank and pump at the city barn from Luther Hollar for \$75;
- to install parallel parking on the east side of Broadway from Chestnut to Main;
- in a 4-2 decision, Council agreed to remove parking meters from in front of the Methodist Church and install them on the west side of Locust Street from the south corner of the Christian Church to the Messy office. Charles Fay and Veach Berry voted against the motion.

Calvin Wills suggested that City Council and the Fiscal Court have a joint meeting at least once a year. The suggestion was received very favorably by all Council members. Fiscal Court will be asked if they would like to have such a meeting.

## Kentucky kicks off Bicentennial

Kentucky has officially launched its 174th Bicentennial celebration.

Dr. Gordon Stewart Wood, a professor of history at Brown University, told a joint session of the General Assembly Wednesday night, Jan. 16, that "the profoundest revolution of the past 200 years has been the introduction of ordinary people into the political process... without politicians there could be no democracy."

Gov. Wendell Ford gave a brief address introducing Wood and Lt. Gov. Julian Carroll announced presentation of the official Bicentennial flag to the assembly. The flag was carried into the House chamber by a special color guard.

The special Bicentennial session was followed by a reception hosted by the Harrodsburg Bicentennial Committee.
