Insurance Co. and Kentucky Finance Co. "We want to allocate these funds where they will do the greatest good for the greatest number of people," he said.

"We, therefore, invite any and all desiring charitable and social welfare agencies to contact our review committee and make known their needs.

He said the invitation is open only to qualified tax-exempt Kentucky organizations, and that applications should be submitted in writing to H.A. Smith, vice president and trust officer, Central Bank, by 5 p.m. Friday, Feb. 15.
