4 cups flour (all purpose)
2 teaspoons sugar
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 eggs
3 cups evaporated milk
4 cups shortening

Do not put into a mixer. Mix by hand. Use spoon batter into greased muffin tins at 425 degrees until done (about 20-25 minutes). Make 3-4 dozen.—Mrs. Margaret Fabbro-Hedden
