Tobacco samples to be taken

Chemical analysis of random samples of tobacco at the marketing level is to be made throughout the marketing period to determine if any pesticide containing DDT or TDE was used on the tobacco after it was field planted, according to Paul E. Hall, farm program official in Nicholas county.

He reminded growers that it is a violation of law to certify falsely that they did not use DDT or TDE on their tobacco after it was planted in the field. Before being issued tobacco marketing cards, producers must certify whether or not DDT or TDE was used. Tobacco marketing cards issued by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service county office are required for all tobacco grown under marketing quotas.

During the past four years practically all producers have certified non-use of materials containing DDT or TDE. Nevertheless, in some areas chemical analysis has shown residual levels of pesticides.

Since tobacco is mixed in the retreating and packing process, use of DDT or TDE by only a few producers can affect the entire area. Mr. Hall said finding DDT or TDE residue could result in loss of important markets for an entire area. Several major buyers have indicated concern about the level of DDT or TDE residue in their
