Historymobile here June 24-27

The Kentucky Historical Society Historymobile will be in Carlisle during the Bicentennial-175th Anniversary celebration, on June 24-27. The Kentucky Historymobile's current program is designed to communicate the story of the first decade of our ancestor's conquest and settlement of the Kentucky area. This part of the exhibit will help the visitor probe the cultural roots and wilderness struggle of the white settlers. A replica of an early log cabin interior furnished with artifacts and reproductions of a slide presentation of a neighborhood settlement at work and play; a series of panels on historically significant persons, movements and events of the first decade of settlement will give the visitor a more realistic and appreciative interpretation of the formative period of our heritage. Persons visiting the Historymobile will meet the historian-traveler in the historical role of Squire Bloomer, brother to Daniel and Separatist Baptist minister of the period, and be taken into the total learning environment of an early home. Questions arising from seeing

the items on exhibit in the log cabin interior will be answered in a conversation between the visitor and historian. After this brief conversation, the visitor will view a synchronized slide-film presentation on the Kentucky settlement culture. This film will include various activities staged by actors using artifacts of the period. Scenes of the Kentucky pioneer at work and play, both as an individual and with neighbors, will reveal the peculiar nature of the way of life in the early Kentucky settlement. An audio-commentary will guide the visitor to a series of three panels designed to visualize the cultural roots of our ancestors in the back country region of the colonies from which most migrated, the land to which they came, and the historical events of the settlement. This three pronged audio-visual approach will offer the visitor first images and commentary on the life and times of earliest settlers who formed a multi-ethnic background began to develop in the wilderness of the Kentucky River area a peculiar identity as a separate people.

\$169,113 for roads in Nicholas county

Governor Wendell H. Ford and Transportation Secretary James E. Rural Secondary Program for Nicholas county. The county's anticipated share of Rural Secondary funds for the year beginning July 1 is \$169,113.

The program selected provides maintenance for 46.1 miles of Rural Secondary roads. It also authorizes "backlog" resurfacing for 1.4 miles of KY 386, the KY 1215 68 Road, and the construction of a drainage structure and approaches on KY 25, the Carlisle-Cynthiana Road. The Rural Secondary Program is supported by two cents of the Commonwealth's motor fuel tax. It originated in 1948.

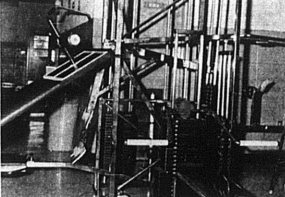
School board defeats bank change motion

The Nicholas County Board of Education defeated a motion at its meeting Saturday night to have the First National Bank of Carlisle serve as depository for school funds for the school years 1974-75 and 1975-76. The board approved a motion for the deposit bank to act as depository for those years. In other business the board opened bids for backslapping the playground but voted to hold the bids for further clarification. The board also voted to employ Courtney Horton to audit the 1973-74 accounts for the sum of \$1,300. Catherine Canupp was granted maternity leave for the first nine weeks of the coming school year. Sen. Thomas M. Ward announces as candidate for Lt. Governor

State Senator, Thomas M. Ward, of Versailles, a 79-year-old minister, farmer, college instructor, a n d businessman, became the first candidate to announce for Lt. Governor. Ward will run in the Democratic Primary in May, 1975. Ward made his announcement in speaking to some 600 supporters from several counties who gathered on the lawn of his Woodford county farm home on Saturday evening. Senator Ward said he was basing his candidacy around a state government reform bill which he is preparing and which will require public notice and competitive bidding on such things as boat docks, the lease of state office buildings, chairlifts, bank deposits, sales agent contracts and engineering contracts, and representing the public interest as opposed to the special interest. Ward said it is time to reform the old system which has been based on political spoils. The old political spoil system costs taxpayers money and causes people to be distrustful of government. "It is time we conducted government in an open manner reform bill which is above reproach," the Woodford Democrat concluded.
