SENSING THE NEWS

THE PRESIDENCY

Little attention has been given to one of the basic concerns of Americans who are opposed to impeachment of the president. They are very concerned about the possibility of the United States following the path of the Latin countries whose presidents are ousted on the basis of political whim.

In the 1930's, Lord Macaulay warned that the U.S. Constitution was all well and good. Unfortunately, this nation suffers from many political and social instabilities. To impeach a president elected by the people, in the judgment of many citizens, would introduce a new and extremely dangerous degree of instability. If the impeachment were accomplished in the case of Richard Nixon, future presidents of the United States would be vulnerable to ouster by a combination of a denunciating opposing political party and media elements which regard themselves as a fourth branch of government. The will of the people, as expressed in a presidential election, could be thwarted by an unstable alliance of ideologues and image-makers.

There is a very real danger that impeachment may proceed on spurious grounds. A President's use of rough language in private talks with his assistants certainly does not constitute high crime or misdemeanor. The late President Harry Truman was notorious for his salty language, but no one suggested that he be removed from office because of his use of profanity. It is that as it may. Yet American president has been removed by the impeachment process. The Congress and the people have been well aware of the peril in setting a precedent. A precedent is a precedent regardless of the excess rather than temper with the stability of the institution of the Presidency.

While many citizens sincerely believe that the impeachment process should be pursued, other citizens are increasingly aware of the Lynch mob hysteria involved in the impeachment movement. Indeed the public, which is supposed to be the final arbiter in the impeachment process, receives a grossly inadequate account of the frenzied campaign against Mr. Nixon.

The networks, for example, manage to convey the idea that the good guys, the guys in the white hats, form the spearhead of the campaign against the President. The television commentators who are so emotionally involved in the campaign against Mr. Nixon, don't report the hardcore radical factor in the drive for impeachment. One wonders how many Americans know that on April 27, thousands of

radicals, shouting "Jail To The Chief" and "Throw The Bum Out" marched down Pennsylvania Avenue in the nation's capital. A contingent of several hundred broke from the impeachment rally and hurled rocks and bottles through the windows of the Justice Department.

This turbulent rally was sponsored by the National Committee To Impeach Nixon. Other groups on hand included the Youth International Party (YIP), Youth Against War and Fascism, the United Farmworkers, the Alticia Brigade, and the Patty Hearst Brigade—all far left radical groups.

Impetachment is biding fair to become the issue that unites the movement again," said revolutionary spokesman Dellinger. For once, Mr. Dellinger was right. Impetachment is uniting all the radical revolutionary groups. Indeed these groups, as in the case of the anti-Vietnam War protests of the 1960's, trigger protests through the radio-voice and establish propaganda units and private clubs with many, many individuals who would not otherwise associate with far left elements.

The active interest of the Communist Party in the establishment of impeachment precedent is not well known. Yet American of the Communist Party, USA, has written: "The impeachment of Nixon as an individual is picked up by many important individuals who would not otherwise associate with far left elements."

FARM & HOME Continued from page 2 essential for farm gleanery to operate at maximum efficiency. **Paint Your Tank:** As much as 7% of fuel stored above ground in dark colored/unlined tanks can evaporate. Evaporation losses can be cut to less than 1% however, if the tank is painted white and capped with a pressure vent. Shading the tank can substitute for painting.

Use the Right Tractor: U.S. farms average three tractors nowadays. Farmers can save fuel by using the right one for the right job. **Plow Shallower:** Except for subsoils, plowing more than seven inches deep does little to improve crop yields. Yet power requirements and consequent fuel use increase markedly when going from seven inch to 11 inch plowing. Sharp plow shares will also cut down fuel needs by improving penetration and reducing draft.

Sharpen Knives: Dull knives can double the power needed to operate a cutter bar. Knives and other sharp tools should be kept sharp for maximum energy efficiency. It is also important to maintain proper har-knife clearance. **Chop Forage Carefully:** Farmers who have been cutting forage at a 1/8 inch setting can realize big power savings by chopping to the length of the cut to 1/4 inch. Such a change reduces power take-off requirement per ton of forage by about one-third. **Break Fuel Wasting Habits:** When equipment is likely to be inactive for some time, it pays to shut off the engine. Restarting the motor will often use considerably less fuel than idling. Working fields the long way cuts down the number of turns that are an inefficient use of fuel energy.
