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City to apply for flood insurance

Councilman Hamon and Clerk-Treasurer Chanslor submit resignations to Council

Two written resignations were accepted by City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

Dr. Andy Hamon resigned as City Councilman because he is moving to Louisville July 1 to continue his education; he will study at the University of Louisville. The vacancy on Council will be filled at the July 8 meeting. City Clerk-Treasurer Robert Chanslor is retiring, effective July 1. The City is taking applications this week for a new clerk-treasurer. Applications must be submitted by 4 p.m. on June 14. Mrs. Clyde Snelling presented a petition to Council requesting that William Hilsander clean the Carlisle City School property before the anniversary celebration, June 23-24. Mrs. Snelling said that out-of-town visitors will be anxious to see the old school and that the grounds are a disgrace. Hilsander was present and stated that there were some looking places within the city—and named some. He then agreed to clean up the property soon. Council voted to ask all Carlisle citizens to clean up their properties within the next 10 days or be subject to fine.

Morgan C. McIlwain from Blue Grass Area Development District, Inc. discussed flood insurance for Carlisle residents who live within flood designated areas. The federally subsidized insurance may be obtained by residents after the city applies and is accepted in the program.

Deadline for application is July 1, 1975. If the City fails to apply, or after application, a resident refuses to purchase the insurance the resident will not be eligible for federal help should a flood occur. Council passed two resolutions concerning application for the flood insurance.

Engineer Don Haase, also of BGADD, discussed federal funding possibilities for obtaining utilities for the area between the City and the Hospital. Council decided to apply for the grants with the understanding that if it proved too expensive, the City would not continue with the project. Sewer Plant Manager Clarence Baugus said that much vandalism has been occurring at the sewer plant. Big rocks are being thrown into the tanks two or three nights a week. Investigation will be made of the vandalism and when the vandals are caught full prosecution will result. Council agreed.

Building permit was granted Fred Burnaw to build a family room onto his home on Cliffway Drive. City employees' salaries were raised 10% across the board, except for policemen who are making less than \$1.90 per hour before May 1. These salaries were raised accordingly May 1. Monthly salaries July 1 will be raised to:

Clarence Baugus, \$200 to \$250; Robert Berry, \$35 to \$43.50; Nancy Jones Bowles, \$22.50 to \$43.25; Allen Carlwey, \$23 to \$25.50; Mike Jones, \$41 to \$49.10; Oliver Vice, \$23 to \$25.50; Margaret Wade, \$30 to \$32.

The Kentucky Rescue Squad was given \$120 to buy emergency equipment now. Later a meeting will be held with Civil Defense Head Rube Williams to attain a working agreement between

the two groups to buy the Rescue Squad on buy equipment through Civil Defense.

Carlisle Main Street from Locust to Broadway and Broadway from Locust to Chestnut—were turned over to the American Legion July 1 to 4 for the Blackberry Festival, provided the state agrees. One sign was reserved for the Kentucky Rescue Squad by the City. The streets will be used for Carnival rides.

Council decided to have City Hall sandblasted on the front side and three

sides at the top. Cost of sandblasting will be \$600.

The City and County will purchase a new fire alarm as soon as possible. The old one does not work, and it is necessary to get another right away. The City of Carlisle will enter a float in the Bicentennial Parade on June 24. The solid brass bell from the City Hall tower will be used on the float.
