under which Nicholas County, Kentucky was originally divided into election precincts under the new Kentucky Constitution. There were 1 Lower Blue Licks; 2 Headquarters; 3 Elliptical; 4 Carlsle; 5 Union; and 6 Upper Blue Licks. There were general stores, post offices, trading stations, schools and churches in each of these precincts, until in recent years. Most of the county stores have now disappeared—only a very few remain. There are still churches in all of the original precincts. All schools have been consolidated into Nicholas County High School and Nicholas County Elementary—both located at the edge of Carlsle.

The history of each of these precincts and their evolution to the present time is now being researched and plans are being made to publish it in The Nicholas County History in 1978.

Kay's Kitchen

In keeping with the Bicentennial theme the recipes this week date back to 1874 and 1878 that I know of, some perhaps earlier. I am not sure of the dates.

The Biscuits recipe received this 1878 must surely have come to Kentucky originally from Virginia or Maryland or anywhere along the East Coast since it calls for soft shell crabs which definitely are not common in Kentucky.

BURGO
from Thomas H. Pickrel Farm Ledger 1873

A large caldron is placed in position ready for the fire. Put some red pepper pods in the bottom, then tomatoes, and corn are added, 1/2 dozen prairie chickens, 1/2 dozen fresh chickens, two dozen soft shell crabs and three or four young squirts, enough water to barely float the contents. Cook slowly for six hours and stir with hockey stick. Flavor to taste. It is not done until the meats are thoroughly shredded.

TO MAKE YEAST
Three large potatoes, boil in clear water; then wash them, skin and all, in a quart of the potato water, a tablespoonful of yore, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of dissolving yeast added after the above preparation is cool.

LIGHT BREAD
Take one quart of flour, four table-spoonfuls of yeast, one teaspoonful of granulated sugar, one dessert-spoonful of lard, and a little salt. In summer make up with warm water, in winter with cold. Make into a ball and work well at least 15 minutes in the machine. Put into a tin and let it be coming to rise, work it over just a little without taking it out of the bucket, or without adding flour. Put it on hot before baking, turn it out and make it into rolls as quickly as possible, adding just a little flour as you can along with, to prevent it from adhering to the hands. Do not work it in summer, make it at 11 o'clock, and in winter about 8. It will be ready for use.

WHITE-SPONGE CAKE
Whites of 26 eggs, 76 globules of sugar, 2 1/2 cups of flour, one cup of lemon, one of cream, 1/2 cup of butter, stir flour, take quickly.

WINE CAKE
One pound sugar, ten ounces butter, two cups of flour, one pennyweight of soda and two of cream of tartar, three fourths of a pint of milk, and lemon juice. Beat butter and sugar till light, adding sugar gradually; then the milk, lemon juice, cream of tartar, soda and flour. Put the cake-moulds with sugar; pour in the batter and bake in a moderate oven.

WEDDINGS

LADY CAKE
One and a half pounds sugar, one pound butter, one and a half pounds flour, one pint whites of eggs, add almonds and lemon juice. Beat the juice and sugar to a cream, add gradually the eggs, the lemon juice and almonds; then the flour as gently as possible. Bake in a moderate oven.

CHEEKEN SALAD
Two large cold fowls, either boiled or roasted, pucks of rice hard boiled eggs, half a pint sweet oil, half a pint vinegar, a gill of mixed mustard, a small teaspoonful cayenne pepper, some salt, two large heads of celery. The dressing must be mixed, very smooth; the longer it is stirred with a buttered basting pan, cover and set aside to rise again. When light brush over with butter, then sprinkle with sugar and cinnamon and bake a half hour, covering for the first quarter hour with paper.

BRISING FOR CHEEKEN SALAD
Yolks of four eggs beaten, one teaspoonful sugar, salt-spoonful of cayenne pepper, two teaspoonfuls made mustard, six tablespoonfuls salad oil, five of vinegar; stir all well, and put in a saucepan; boil for fifteen, stirring all the time. When cold, pour over chicken salad.

LONDON CLUB SALAD
One onion vinegar, one pound black pepper, half pound cayenne pepper, half pint oil, two ounces cloves, four ounces salt, six ounces burnt sugar. Put all in a stone jar and let steep a week.

WHITE PUDDING
[DRIP PUDDING] ENGLISH
One pint of beef suet, chopped very fine, four ounces of suet, mix with and season highly with salt and black pepper. This mixture is put in strong cloth (enough for a dish in one cloth), allowing room to swell in it. Lay in a tin. Bake in a oven for two hours, or until it is done. Turn it into a dish, and garnish with drippings of roast beef. Serve hot.

This pudding will keep many months. For breakfast, cut of what seems to be a sufficient portion. Turn it into a pie-pan, and beat it. It is only good when very hot.
