Fleming-Mason RECC gets loan

The Fleming-Mason Rural Electric Cooperative Corporation which serves this county was loaned \$300,000 in Washington on Feb. 28 to expand and upgrade its service. Senator Marlow Cook has reported.
Cook said the loan from the U.S. Rural Electrification Administration would be used by the Farmington-based cooperative to finance service for 365 additional consumers, put up 23 miles of distribution line and for other system improvements.
The Coop serves Bath, Bracken, Fleming, Lewis, Mason, Nicholas, Robertson and Rowan counties.
The money was loaned at a five per cent interest rate, and Cook said additional funds would be sought from the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation.
