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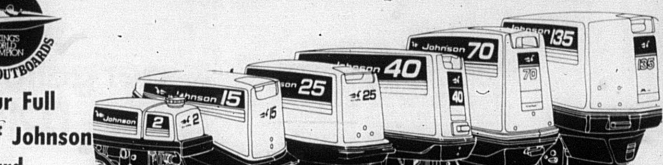

FRANKFORT—We're in the final two weeks of the legislative session and not a single proposed constitutional amendment has passed either branch.

The judicial reform amendment was scheduled to go through the Senate last week, but it can't get through the House before it can go to the ballot next fall.

There is a similar effort in the House. The House is apparently willing to act on the Senate bill.

This proposed amendment would streamline the court system of Kentucky into four branches: the Circuit Court of Appeals, Circuit Court and District Court.

The District Court would handle all cases now going through county courts and justice courts and some that now go to the Circuit Court.

There would be only two courts, Circuit and District, at the local level and the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals would be at the state level.

Usually the legislature approves constitutional amendments to go to the ballot in November, but only one is near passage at this stage.

Another proposed amendment is House Bill 138, sponsored by Rep. Tom Clarke, D-Danville, that calls for a constitutional convention to pass the House and is now in a Senate Committee, but it can't get on the ballot until this November: are.

There are companion bills in the Senate.
