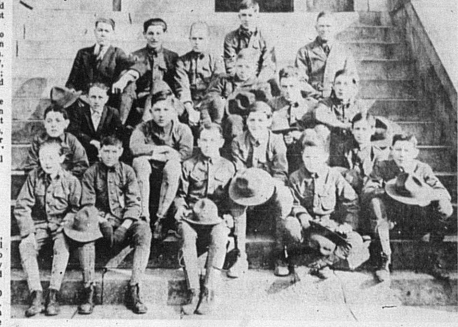
Mrs. Millie Kenney entered St. Joseph Hospital, Lexington, on Sunday where she will undergo surgery later this week.
