A secondary purpose is to cut the amount of paper work by substantially reducing the number of reporting forms presently required by three separate systems of work registration. The new Work Registration System will enable a client to register one time and in one place.
The new Work Registration System is a federally funded program for state-wide testing. John H. Gray will be assisted by Ken Hiten, Area Manager and Income Maintenance Supervisors Mrs. L. W. Moberly, Bourbon, Harrison, Nicholas, and Scott counties; Ms. E. Foley, Fayette and Foster (Gibbard), Jessamine counties.
The Bureau for Manpower Services and Social Insurance administer the Food Stamp Program, WPA (Work Incentive Program) the Medical Assistance Program for unemployed fathers as well as assistance payments, disability determination and unemployment insurance.

Farm fencing, debris clearance in relief bill

"The final emergency disaster relief bill will include language directing the reinstatement of conservation programs providing for the repair and replacement of farm fencing and for clearance of debris from farmroads, according to Senator Walter Huddleston.

The language was put in the bill by Senate and House conferees at the urging of Senator Huddleston, Agriculture Committee chairman Herman Talmaidge, and several other senators from the states hit by the recent tornado.

On March 13, the Department of Agriculture eliminated fencing from the list of materials eligible for federal cost-sharing under the emergency agriculture program of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. This administrative decision also sharply curtailed federal cost-sharing for debris clearance.

Senator Huddleston said the Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation reported that more than 1,200 miles of farm fencing was destroyed and 183,000 acres of farmland covered with debris during the recent tornado.

"I am highly pleased that the Senate and House conferees moved so quickly to help meet the needs of Kentucky farmers," Huddleston said. "Hopefully, we can now get these worthwhile programs resumed just as quickly as possible."

The doctors that receive the fellowship must sign a contract to practice in Kentucky. Members of the Carleisle Junior Women's Club are donating hand-made items to be sold.

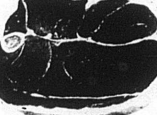
Hunts entertain with egg hunt alumnae head
